Knitting for others

All the knitting that was received during the summer has now been taken to "Operation Sunshine". There are still over one and a half million orphans in South Africa who are in need of care. Their major need during the winter is to be able to keep warm during the very cold nights. All we need to provide are 8" knitted squares which are made into blankets by volunteers. What an easy way to help others to make their life warmer and better! If anyone is interested in knitting squares for the orphans, here is the pattern:

FOR ONE 8"/20cm SQUARE, you will need:

Yarn from a 100 gram (3.5 oz) ball of yarn or scraps of double knit (UK) yarn or wool and a pair of size 4mm (old size 8) (UK) needles

1. Cast on 40 stitches (try to make your stitches neither too loose nor too tight to help ensure uni form squares)

2. Row 1: knit

3. Row 2: knit. These two rows form the 'garter' stitch knitting pattern for your square

4. Continue knitting as per these two rows until you have knitted a square

5. To ensure you square is 8"/20cm either use a tapemeasure or form a triangle by folding one cor ner of your square over to meet the opposite corner as shown - if all sides are equal - then you have a square!



VERY IMPORTANT

Leave a one metre (one and a quarter yards) length of your yarn attached to your work after you have cast off. This will be used to join the squares together.

There is also a need for scarves and hats and jumpers. Antoinette Tourret does have a simple pattern for these if anyone would like a copy.

If you would like any help, please contact: Jenny Miles (824280) or Antoinette Tourret (826292). We will collect finished squares and clothes, and take them to the charity.

It was a wonderful and humbling experience for me on Saturday 5th October as in a packed church, supported by friends, loved ones, the Bishop of Richborough and several priests gathered around the altar with me, I gave thanks on the silver anniversary of my priesthood. So many people have said how moving and uplifting they found the Mass of Christ the King and indeed there was an extraordinarily happy and spirit-filled atmosphere. Then, and again so humbling, was the party which followed with an abundance of platters laden with such super food and which I am now aware was provided by over 30 individuals and organisations from our villages. How incredibly kind – thank you so much!

Among those there was a dear friend known from my teenage days and the Church Youth Club. Now sadly afflicted by MS, but radiant still, she made the chasuble (the robe worn by a priest symbolising putting of Christ's robe as his words over bread and wine are recalled, thankfully also symbolising covering the imperfections of the priest) for my first Mass 25 years ago. Almost wheelchair bound, it was lovely to have her there and a privilege to take communion to her during the service. The week before and after the celebration, both our super schools treated me to wonderful assemblies with splendid cards, poems and presentations all making me feel very special indeed. My affectionate thanks to them and to everyone who has been a part of some wonderful moments.

Some more sincere thanks, but concerning the maintenance of our Church building. As I write, work has had to be put in hand for essential and very expensive repairs to the gulley between the main building, Lady Chapel and Choir Vestry. This will certainly dent our Fabric Fund and the support we receive to maintain the fund is crucial. The amazing Gift Day total (with reclaimed tax of approximately £200!) is £1,930.87 and rising. We are so encouraged by such a generous response. Thank you. These are hard times financially for many people and for Harvest this year we are supporting the Dover Food Bank with gifts to help those struggling to provide adequate food for their families. Church was packed for the School Harvest Service and so many gifts received for this project. Thank you for such generosity.

And finally, we need no reminding that the month of remembrance is here. On Monday 4th (TE this year) at 6.30 p.m. we remember with thanksgiving at the simple Requiem our departed loved ones. In our traditional services on Remembrance Sunday (10th) we come to express the deepest thanks for every life sacrificed for our sakes, mixed with the deepest sorrow for such colossal and dreadful loss.

Village Folk

The amount of energy and enthusiasm that emanates from this month's guest has left me reeling - this whirlwind is **Gloria Barnett**.

Gloria was born in Ealing, London in 1946 to a Lancastrian father and a Cockney mother. Her start in life co-incided with the struggle families had to endure at the end of the second world war and her family was no exception. Because of the lack of housing at that time (vast swathes of London had been flattened by bombs), they lived in three small rooms on the top floor of



a house which had an outside loo. They bathed in a tin bath in front of the kitchen stove - a concept probably totally alien to those of you in Temple Ewell lucky enough to have en-suites. The family moved to Bracknell, Berkshire when Gloria was 8 and that is where she finished her schooling at age 15, having "been pushed" (Gloria's words) for the final 2 years into a shorthand and typing course.

Although aspirational, her career had to start as a shorthand typist but every cloud... Her first job was where she met her husband of some 45 years, Chris. Her first interesting career break came at age 20 when she went to London to work for the BBC in their Presentation Unit. This unit was responsible for every programme being put on air. Her enthusiasm soon earned her promotion and one of her tasks was to assist the then weatherman (Graham Parker - remember him?) with his magnetic weather board (she was in charge of the clouds!!). She was also involved with the preparations for converting black and white television into colour. Interestingly, one of the anecdotes she tells of that time is about tennis balls. Yup. Tennis balls always used to be white in colour. When colour TV started, the early technical limitations could not distinguish the white balls in flight so... they were changed to yellow and are still this colour to-day.

Okay, back to Gloria who by now had become engaged to Chris but was still commuting daily between Bracknell and London - quite an effort in those days so that when they married in 1968, she left the BBC. In 1971, they moved to Norfolk where Gloria got a job at the Norfolk College of Arts & Technology. This is where it all really started happening for the 25 year old secretary. One of her tasks was to type the exam papers and she discovered a growing interest in the subjects she was typing about. As a result, she studied at evening class where she obtained A level English. By now it was 1973 and Gloria and Chris's first child, Matthew, had been born. Not to be swayed from her new found love of learning, she continued her evening class studies and obtained a further A level, this time in History. Babies number two and three (Hannah and Becki) followed in quick succession and Gloria found it understandably more difficult to be studying at night school with three children under the age of 5, running the local playschool and working as a school sciencetechnician. Not to be daunted she used what precious little spare time she had to continue her studies but this time with a degree course with the Open University where, in 1985, she completed her BA in Science - a subject she had always been keenly interested in.

After her degree, Gloria knew that she wanted to teach the Sciences to the 11-18 age group. So, in 1986 she completed a Post Graduate Certificate of Education at Canterbury's Christ Church College. Her first teaching position was at a school in Sittingbourne for the next 5 years . She then achieved promotion and taught A level Biology at St Edmunds School in Dover - which she dearly loved. She

quickly took over there as Head of Science and remained for 10 years, during which time she also worked to obtain her Masters Degree in Education.

She and Chris retired early as they were keen to spend more time scuba diving and they both wanted to pursue their joint love of sailing while they were both fit enough to enjoy the sport. Phew - you think to yourself. Well...at least she will get a chance to relax now. Nope! Three weeks into retirement, she agreed to take on the role of a Consultant in Secondary Science Education. This involved helping teachers to improve their teaching skills, and in particular to teach exciting science. Gloria's school improvement work continued for six years, in over 30 schools in London, often prior to an Ofsted visit. The commute from Temple Ewell to different areas of London throughout the week resulted in a very stressful working day starting at 5am, returning home at 8pm. At this time she was also writing and presenting teacher training courses and writing revision books. This was in addition to the charitable works she and Chris were also involved with.

She knew that she could not maintain this pace indefinitely and one summer evening, after spending the day sailing with some friends off the coast of France, they were musing over a glass or two. Gloria was chatting away in her usual passionate manner about her love of the sciences, and the underwater world of our oceans and it was suggested that she start offering her talents as a speaker. Temple Ewell being ideally located for Dover cruises, it did not take Gloria long to find a cruise liner that was all too happy to have her enthusiastic services as a guest speaker aboard. Her reputation grew steadily and she has to date featured aboard many different ships on a variety of cruise lines, travelling on some 20+ cruises to exotic places over the past 6 years.

It was during one of those cruises that an interested audience member spoke to Gloria to suggest that she should write a book on the topic of her series of talks. As a result, yes, you guessed it, Gloria is now a published author with her book entitled The Amazing World Beneath The Waves covering all the areas of oceanography that she speaks about. She has since additionally published a detailed report on climate change entitled Climate Change - the Critical Role of the Oceans.

Earlier in this article, I touched briefly on Gloria's charity work. Both she and Chris have been involved with Rotary Club of Dover for many years and she was honoured to hold the role of President in 2011. Her favourite memory of that year was visiting an orphanage in Adana, Turkey where she meet the carers, teachers and children and witnessed how money raised by the Rotary Club had been spent on providing a music centre for the children.

This lady's future continues to be jam packed. The only cloud on the horizon for Gloria is that she and Chris have, only a few days ago, sadly had to sell their beloved racing yacht as, after many years balancing on a speeding yacht, her knees have expressed a preference to desist from any further similar activity.

It was such a pleasure to meet you Gloria. You are a great inspiration to those who were / are not lucky enough to come from families where a university education was affordable.

You Decide Grants Scheme

KCC and Dover District Council have accepted Temple Ewell Parish Council's application for the "You Decide" grant scheme 2013/14. Applicants can apply for a grant up to a maximum of £2,500.

As Dragon Wood will be receiving the Queen Elizabeth Fields Trust Deed of Dedication this year, grant funding will be sought to improve the community wood. Woodlands can provide health and lifestyle benefits for people by creating a recreational space for the community to enjoy and an educational resource for local schools. Woodlands are also valuable for nature conservation. They create a corridor for wildlife to move between existing habitats and new woodlands soon develop their own flora, insect, mammal and bird populations.

THE PROJECT

Dragon Community Wood, adjacent to the Lydden and Temple Ewell Nature Reserve and providing access to it, was purchased for the village in 1985 by the Parish Council and is a haven for a variety of wildlife and wild flowers. The woodland has little signage on the road but the free car park, and access into the reserve, is situated behind the houses in the middle of Temple Ewell village, on the north side of London Road, opposite the entrance to the High Street. The Parish Council is keen to provide a welcoming entrance, several informative signboards displaying themed educational and sustainable environmental information, coupled with accessible paths and seating, as well as woodland and other habitat restoration. Moreover, engaging the community with Dragon Wood gives them a stake in its future, and means that is less likely to experience fly-tipping, be vandalised or abused. Our small woodland has a special and valuable role within the village and also accessible to the wider community, and we aim to ensure that everybody has the opportunity to use, understand, engage with and to be inspired by the natural environment.

THE EVENT – Saturday 23rd November 2013

Each organisation will be given five voting pads to distribute amongst their supporters. DDC have limited the voting pads to five in order that all organisations, both large and small, are given the same chance. Members of the public can also vote, so we hope that parishioners of Temple Ewell will come along and help us secure funding for our Community Wood project.

The full Parish Council meets on the last Tuesday of the month (excluding August & December) at 7.15pm at the Temple Ewell Baptist Church Hall on the corner of

the High Street and London Road. Parishioners are most welcome to attend and contribute to meetings.

Recipes for your Guy Fawkes Party

Bonfire Night Treacle Toffee To Stick Jaws Shut

Ingredients: 2 1/2 cups soft brown sugar 1/2 cup demerera sugar 2/3 cup water 1/4 cup black treacle 1/4 cup butter 1 teaspoon vinegar



Recommended equipment: Sugar Thermometer.

Before you start, butter a low-side cake-tin and set aside, you'll be pouring the toffee in it for setting later. Place ingredients in large heavy pan and heat slowly, stirring constantly until sugar dissolves. Then, cover and bring to a strong boil. To keep mixture from sticking to the bottom, stir for the next 10 minutes, or until your mixture reaches 280°F.

If you don't have a sugar thermometer and you want to check that your mixture is ready, drop a little of the mixture, into a glass of cold water. If it forms a hard ball, then the toffee is ready to be set.

Pour into the tin you prepared and let cool. When the toffee is half set, mark it into squares.

When the toffee is hard, break it up, and eat inordinate amounts!

Bonfire Baked Potatoes

Items Needed:

One potato and a long stick or instrument to shove the potato into the bonfire. Butter, salt, pepper, and other condiments to lather onto your baked potato.





Find a good potato and wrap it tin foil. Take your long stick or instrument to shove the potato gently into the bottom of the bonfire.

The base of the bonfire is where all the heat is, so watch your fingers and eyebrows. Don't forget where you put your potato! About forty-five minutes later (one hour later, if you picked a very big potato), pull out that spud and let it cool for a few minutes.
