

Humble Bumble in Spring

The first bumble bee this year visited an early flowering crocus in my garden during a rare sunny spell in early February: a sure sign of Spring I thought! Only a few weeks ago, while picking a few pretty, dark purple crocusses for a small vase, a big queen bumble bee descended and spent the next few minutes bumbling about the flowers in my hand, scattering pollen everywhere.

The bee's hairy coat helps it to keep it warm, so it can start to forage much earlier in the season, while honey bees stay tucked up in their hives. Bumble bees do not store much honey in their small nests, just enough to get by, so a good garden or field with nectar-rich flowers is very important. The bee's fur colours and stripes tell you which species out of 24 native to the UK you are seeing, although some are not easy to tell apart unless you are an expert.

Different species have different lengths of tongues so they feed on different shaped flowers; a longer tongue can access deeper, funnel-shaped flowers, for example beans and peas, making them very important for vegetable growers. Did you know that an unpollinated pea flower produces a curved pod? That's a disaster for growers, as mechanised harvesting becomes impossible, and so the pea would not appear on your plate, or be much more expensive because it had to be handpicked. And tomatoes are pollinated by bumble bees shaking their shoulders (the loud buzzing you hear) to release pollen which otherwise remains trapped and unusable.

This early in spring you will only see big queen bees buzzing about, feeding and finding a suitable nesting site to raise worker and male bees during the summer season. These guys are much smaller, cannot sting and only live for a few months, during which they need to find plenty of food, and that is becoming a problem,.

With loss of habitat and lack of varied sources of nectar available, the humble bumble bee is struggling, with 2 species already becoming extinct in the past 50 years. Conservation, you ask? Yes, it seems that if we want to keep our cheap peas and tomatoes, conservation is necessary. 

KCC and DDC Councillor

At last, following a long wet winter, the season appears to be turning a corner and we have had some really warm spring days. For those of us who enjoy gardening or for those who have a plot on an allotment to grow their own vegetables and flowers, there is but a small window of time with which to sow seeds, take cuttings or

prepare the ground for sowing. Those of us who undertake gardening in their own gardens or on an allotment will find a therapeutic effect carrying out what are simple tasks, though at times physically demanding. The health benefits are many, the mental therapy of being able to carry out what may appear to others as a mundane task, however that task allows you to relax, to become lost in your thoughts or to plan for an event at some time in the future. The physical effort uses a multiple of muscles around your body which will in turn consume calories, plus you are out in the open allowing your body to absorb that vital vitamin D, which may ward off some ailments.

Being out working the ground in this way should make you more aware of nature and the immediate environment, so you will understand that you would not entertain cutting your hedges after February to prevent disturbing nesting birds, thus, hopefully some of our diminishing bird species such as the Sparrow, Blue Tits, Starlings and some of the Finches that were so plentiful in the 1970s may gradually build to their numbers of a few decades ago. Basically one can enjoy the benefits of the countryside to improve both mental and physical health and it does not cost a penny.

There are many ways to enjoy the countryside even if you do not want to work in the garden, you can walk, jog, run, ride or drive. These can be all done on Public Rights of Way, by using Footpaths, Byways, and Bridleways, Restricted Byways, Permissive Paths or Green lanes. But who may use these various routes? Here is a simple explanation for your reference.

A Footpath is for use by pedestrians and dogs kept on a lead. The footpath is denoted by a yellow arrow. A Bridleway can be used by pedestrians, horse riders, pedal cyclists. Pedal cyclists should give way to horse riders, horse riders and pedal cyclists are required to give way to pedestrians. Bridleways are denoted by blue arrows.

A Restricted Byway can be shared by pedestrians, horse riders, pedal cyclists and non motorised vehicles. Bear in mind the word "motorised" is not restricted to an internal combustion engine, it can apply to an electric engine too. Restricted Byways are denoted by mauve arrows.

A Byway can be shared by pedestrians, horse riders, pedal cyclists and certain motorised vehicles. These Byways are clearly denoted on ordinance survey maps. A Permissive path is a route across private land that the owner of that land permits to be used as a footpath, bridleway or a road. The landowner can withdraw per-

mission or vary the route. These routes are denoted by a black or white arrow. A Green lane is not a legal definition for a "right of way." Green Lanes may carry all of the above or have no rights of way at all.

Vehicle users and horse riders should be aware that they are not exempt from certain aspects of the Road Traffic Act regarding offences such as "wanton furious driving or riding."

Kearsney Walk - 6.1 miles - starts at Kearsney Abbey Car Park

To get a map of this walk go to - http://www.walkinginkent.co.uk/dover.php (other Dover walks also available to download)

- 1. Walk out of car park entrance and cross the road. Go R along the footpath, then take the narrow road to the L (Scotland Common) and continue up steep hill; the road leads onto a track. Follow track until you see red & blue arrows on R and yellow arrow on L, take L path and continue through wood to a stile, follow path across the field keeping bushes to L until you reach a paddock with a gate and stile to the L.
- 2. After crossing stile go to L of large tree and continue straight ahead. Go down the hill and turn R (army land ahead). When you reach the road cross WITH CARE and continue through the farm and up hill through three gates. Path now turns the R, (do not go through the gate on L) follow line of field fence until you reach a wooded area.
- 3. Follow track ahead through the wood until you reach the road. Turn R and look for a stile on the L (app 100yds) at passing place on the road. After crossing stile continue across the field; numerous buildings come into view ahead, and where a path crosses in front of you take the path to the L, turn L and continue along the concrete road, passing the ruins of St Radigund's Abbey, B, until you cross cattle grid.
- 4. Turn R on Abbey Road towards Dover, WITH CARE continue for app 1300 yds; when the road starts to go down hill take the road to the L. At FP sign on R at app 100 yds, take path through the bushes (if you go to R off the path a few yards you can get a good view of the Castle, Town and Harbour). Then continue until you reach waymarker, where you take path to the L to zigzag following markers through bushes down the hill and onto a small playing field; the path continues along the back of the houses and down steps onto Lewisham Road.
- 5. Cross road and walk to the R, (athletic ground on opposite side of road). Continue to next junction. (Look up towards the railway bridge opposite. Where the 1st bungalow now stands, in 1917, a tram overturned causing the deaths of 11 passengers.) Turn L into Lower Road. (Buildings on right are the old Crabble Paper Mill, and further along the road you will see the Corn Mill D.)
- 6. After the Mill the road goes R over a narrow road bridge and further on you lose sight of the river behind the houses. Pass the Royal Oak Public House, and later the village shop; continue on till you see the Dublin Man of War Public House. Cross the road into Minnis Lane and turn through a small gate on your R; this path leads into the Abbey grounds and back to the Car Park.



Village Folk

I am delighted to report that this month's guest is **Jasper Hagger**. Many of you may have seen his name listed in various amateur dramatic programmes, or even know him by sight as, being a non driver, he is often seen walking to and from the Village Hall.

Jasper was born in Cambridge, the son of a tenant farmer to Wimpole Hall, a sprawling country estate. He recounts an amusing - and true - story of Lord Clifton, the then owner of Wimpole Hall, getting



dressed one morning when he spotted a village woman watching him from the road. He was so incensed by the intrusion into his privacy that he had the whole village (except the Church) moved 1/2 mile down the road!! Those were the days...

Life was blissfully happy for the young Jasper until age 14 when his father sadly died. Unable to look after the farm, his mother was offered a job in the prison service and Jasper moved in with relatives in Norfolk to complete his schooling. His mother visited him as often as she could and he was always keen to hear her stories. The most famous person she guarded was while working in Holloway Prison where she met the infamous Christine Keeler ("a very nice lady"!!). For those readers unaware of the history, this very glamorous woman was involved in a major sex scandal in the 1960s which involved some very senior politicians. Apparently, after she had been convicted, some strings were pulled and she was given the much sought after role of working in the prison library - which she hated. She therefore accepted the alternative role of scrubbing floors (huh?).

A promotion in 1966 meant his mother accepted a job at Dover Borstal which came with a tied bungalow so Jasper was then able to join her again.

Having completed his education, Jasper had aspirations of becoming a Marine Insurance Broker but in the 1960s, fewer but bigger ships were being built, thereby reducing the demand for Broking services.

Having looked long and hard at the job opportunities available to him in the area, he decided to apply for a position with the Automobile Association who were one of the major employers in the Dover area. They had large offices situated inside Dover Port as apart from the services we are all aware of, they also used to book ferry tickets. A successful interview followed and Jasper was offered the role as Temporary Assistant Port Officer. He chuckles to recall the temporary part of this title as he says, 33 years later he was still there!!! Jasper loved every minute of working for the AA. He was mainly involved with the ferry crossings as this was pre-computer days so everything had to be written out by hand (usually in triplicate!!) so the administration was quite onerous for passengers travelling from the UK into Europe.

- The statistic he quoted that quite amazed me was that there were 3 ferries a day to Calais each ferry capable of taking 120 cars, 2 ferries daily to Boulogne and 2 to Ostend.
- Only cars were permitted to travel lorries and vans travelled to Europe from alternative ports. In the early 1970, Townsend Thoresen was the first company to introduce freight cargo from Dover and subsequently - as indeed we are all firmly aware - the transportation of freight has escalated massively.
- Did you know that there used to be a train service from London which left at midnight, arriving at Dover docks where the entire train would be loaded onto a ferry and transported to Dunkirk? Arriving at Dunkirk the train would be split into two - one part trav elling by rail to Paris and the remainder by rail to Brussels.

During his employment with the AA, Jasper was promoted through the ranks subsequently attaining the title of Chief Port Officer in charge of a team of 14 people. He has never wanted to travel from Dover and why should he? This is still the main port in the UK and busier with each passing year.

In 1998, Jasper was made redundant and recalls fondly the night he and 7 fellow Officers celebrated by travelling to Calais and back as foot passengers in the Champagne lounge. No, I don't think many would have believe any staggering seen that night was due to surging tides!!

As he was in his early 50s Jasper felt he was not ready to retire so finding himself free, he decided to turn his attention to the theatre which had always been of great interest to him. His mother had introduced him to amateur dramatics when he was about 12 years old and his love for the theatre has never abated since.

Channel Theatre Group was a band of actors Jasper became involved with, learning and flexing his skills as a set builder, stage manager, sound engineer and general help backstage. The company was a professional one although all the helpers backstage were voluntary. They performed all over the South East of England at many venues and Jasper recalls fondly his time in Brighton when they were performing there for several weeks. He told me that in his "theatrical digs", he awoke one morning and threw back his curtains to see the sky an odd colour. Deciding to investigate, he hurried outside to be met by the unforgettable sight of Brighton's West Pier engulfed in flames. Luckily he had his camera with him and managed to take images of the destruction every 20 minutes.

In addition to Channel Theatre, he has been a member of the Temple Ewell Players for many years and has served at different times as Chairman, Treasurer, Stage Manager plus some acting too. He currently forms part of the organisation team who are responsible for "front of house" at all productions held.

The next time you attend a play or panto at the Village Hall, the chances are it will be Jasper who shows you to your seat. He is always ready with a smile and a kind word and a valued member of our village.

A number of parishioners have been talking about the potholes in the village and asked the PC to include the KCC claim policy, so it follows:-

Kent County Council - Highway Potholes Making a claim for damage to your vehicle

If you wish to make a claim for damage to your vehicle, please call us on 03000 41 81 81.

KCC will only acknowledge receipt of your claim form if requested to do so and will attempt to provide you with a decision on liability within 90 days of receiving your form.

The law

There is no automatic right to compensation.

The law gives a defence to us as a highway authority against claims for compensation in recognition that the highway network cannot remain in a perfect condition at all times and defects will arise.

We have a duty to take reasonable steps to maintain the highway network within our jurisdiction. The steps taken depend on the classification of the road. We will not have to compensate if we can demonstrate we took reasonable steps to maintain the highway. This means inspections and repairs were carried out as planned or reported.

In order for a claim to succeed, there must be clear evidence we have been negligent in our role as the highway authority. The fact a defect may have developed within the highway network and caused damage does not in itself mean we are liable to pay compensation.

Because of the legal defence available the majority of compensation claims are unsuccessful.

Before claiming

Please think carefully before you submit a claim.

We investigate all claims so even the cost of us processing your request diverts money away from important frontline services.

Any compensation is paid out from public money, so we will always remain robust in justifying the claim.

What happens if I make a claim?

- * You will need to complete a claim form with full and accurate details. Only once you have provided full details will your claim be processed.
- * The circumstances of your claim will then be carefully investigated by us.

You may be required to attend a site meeting with an official.

* Once the circumstances of your claim have been investigated, you will be informed in writing of our view on liability. If we are unable to meet your request for compensation you will be provided with a written explanation for this decision

How is a claim decided?

All claims are investigated and decided on an individual basis. The decision on liability will be based on the facts of each case and the law. Ultimately, it is only a court that can decide if we are liable to pay compensation. We are mindful of a court's likely interpretation of each claim when making a decision on liability. If it is considered that a court would not award compensation then a claim will be rejected.

Evidence of damage or financial loss

The law requires you to keep your losses to a minimum meaning you remain responsible for arranging repairs as soon as possible. Original repair documents and receipts will always be required in support of your claim.

If the cost of repairs are is likely to exceed £500 we may wish to inspect the damaged property before repairs are carried out.

Professional fees

You have the right to seek independent legal or other professional advice. It would be inappropriate for us to advise you whether or not to instruct a third party to act on your behalf.

We have well-established procedures for dealing with compensation claims, which remain the same whether you make a claim directly or through a third party. Even if we accept liability for your incident, you may not be entitled to recover any professional fees incurred.

Reporting a fault




