

On the night Jesus Christ was born to a peasant girl in the overcrowded town of Bethlehem, few comprehended the potential that God had released in the world, bound tightly in swaddling clothes. It would be thirty years before that potential was fully released. A few were privileged to be given an insight into the hope and promise embodied in that child. The ageing Simeon was one such man. He counted it the greatest blessing in his life to hold the Saviour of the world in his arms and was then happy to die having seen hope and salvation for mankind. The ageing Herod was also granted the same foreknowledge. He, like the shepherds, the wise men, and Simeon had news of Christ's birth. He too saw the potential, but rather than look forward with hope and expectation, he was fearful of losing his power and privilege, and we know the dreadful steps he took to protect those things as he ordered the slaughter of innocent children.

If we believe the events of over 2000 years ago to be true, then Christmas offers us two responses. Like Simeon we are offered the greatest blessing of spiritually embracing the Christchild – of holding him in our hearts – of accepting God's gift to us and to the world, and releasing that potential in our lives – of finally knowing and accepting the depth of love for us which some thirty or so years later involved incredible sacrifice upon the Cross before such love's resurrection victory.

Our response, though, of course not involving his awful actions, nevertheless involves something of Herod's response. Rather than accepting God's gift and looking forward once more with the hope of an open heart, we are almost fearful of that and keep the Christchild's potential tightly bound within the trappings of the coming season when there is so much in God's gift to party about!

With every blessing for the coming Christmas and especially remembering those experiencing their first Christmas without a loved one.


Branching Out



With nursery and school terms well underway, parents and guardians of children aged two to seven are being encouraged to get the free flu vaccination for their children.

This year children aged two, three and four, or in school years one, two and three, are all eligible for the flu vaccination on the

NHS. The child-friendly nasal spray means children can avoid having an injection and instead have a quick, painless, squirt into each nostril. Children aged two to four years old can visit their GP for the nasal spray vaccination; while school nurses are running clinics for children in years one, two and three. Children of all ages with a health condition that puts them at greater risk of flu are also eligible for the flu vaccine.

Flu can be a very unpleasant illness in children causing fever, stuffy nose dry cough, sore throat, aching muscles and joints and extreme tiredness. This can often last several days. Some children can get a very high fever, sometimes without the usual flu symptoms, and may need to go to hospital for treatment. Serious complications of flu include a painful ear infection, acute bronchitis and pneumonia. Children can become very poorly if they catch flu and are good at spreading it to others too. We know an ill child affects the wider family, as parents or carers may have to take time off work to look after them. The nasal spray is safe and tailored each year to specific flu viruses – so please do take up this free NHS offer."

KCC Director of Public Health, Andrew Scott-Clark said: "It is particularly important that we reach parents and make sure children are protected as they can easily spread the illness among their friends and family. In the worst cases, seasonal flu can result in a stay in hospital, and it can even be fatal. Younger girls and boys can get the vaccine as a nasal spray rather than a jab but having one can make a huge difference." It is important to get children vaccinated even if they had the flu vaccination last year. The flu vaccine provides protection against the strains of flu that are likely to circulate this year and which may be different from last year. So make sure you visit your GP when offered the nasal spray vaccine (for pre-school children) or complete the consent form so your child can have the vaccine at school (for four to seven year olds.

This year the flu vaccine is being offered to:

- children aged two, three and four years ie born between 1
 September 2011 and 31 August 2014
- children in school years 1,2 and 3 ie born between 1 September 2008 and 31 August 2011
- children with a health condition that puts them at greater risk.



I hope this update finds you all well. Do be careful on the roads, as there have been shock ice and frost spells in the early morning with no gritting on the roads.

As part of my Dover District Councillor communication reaching out to all local residents I will also be putting the full version of this newsletter online. I am delighted that so many residents have submitted their broadband readings to me over this last period – it clearly shows a huge drift in services with no reflection in the monthly costs being charged to each resident. It is shameful that so many people are suffering awfully poor network connectivity, not worth using or no connectivity at all, and are still being charged the same rates as those who have 10-25mbps speeds!

Children and parents all need to access online services 24/7 for e-homework and basic utilities and banking every day, but sadly many of you are reporting you cannot do this once a week with the lowest village speeds recorded being 0.09mbps, 0.027 and 0.34mbps. I think that poor services are unacceptable and am sad to hear of others telling me



they wish to move away as a result of historically poor network services. It is not acceptable to have residents wait another two years for everyone to access what



will be very below average broadband offers. Dover has 220mbps for the last three years.

Please do continue to send in your household readings, so we can use these in a campaign with support from others who are equally concerned about the slow connectivity. Residents for both (Archers Court PCP10T) and Sheperdswell cabinet PCP7 should send in their readings. With thanks!

Reflecting on Christmases Past After a Dream

At the first Epiphany, the last day of Christmas, the three wise men or Magi were led by a star to Bethlehem bringing their gifts of gold, frankinsense and myrrh in homage to the baby Jesus lying in a manger.

clip-clop of hooves and a rumble of wheels as a carriage laboured up Church Hill and, stopping at the gate of the church, the horses' breath steaming in the cold December air, the driver jumped down to open the door of the carriage from which descended a gentleman in a long great-coat and holding a tall beaver felt hat, with the other hand assisting a lady dressed in a crinoline gown with a velvet mantle. Her bonnet and muff were lined with fur. She was followed by a small boy dressed in fur from head to toe, wearing a be-ribboned hat and carrying a large sprig of holly! The carriage moved on, and gentleman replacing his hat, the couple proceeded towards the church where other similarly dressed personages, and villagers in more simple winter garb, were about to enter.



There followed much doffing of hats, half curtseys and tugging of forelocks as all exchanged Christmas greetings before the assemblage entered the church, the long skirts of the ladies swishing and rustling as they made their way to their pews.

The church glowed with candlelight and everywhere was holly, ivy and other evergreens with a gaily dressed fir tree. Already seated in two pews towards the front was a family, comprising an elderly lady and a younger couple, with two small boys in the pew ahead. The boys were scuffling and giggling, excited in child-like anticipation of new toys and the feast to come, this provoked a poke from the stick of the elderly lady behind, surely their grandmother!

The organ was playing softly as the rector, the Revd. Turnbull, a tall, rather severe looking priest with side whiskers, approached the lectern to welcome his parishioners this Christmas morn, giving the boys a rather stern look though his eyes held a certain twinkle!

Then, the strains of the first hymn 'Oh Come all ye Faithful' rang out joyously, the faces of the congregation lit by the glow of many candles.....


