I have received an apology from KCC over delays in putting in place parking restrictions following a site meeting I had with them on the Lydden Hill U-turn areas.

I met with two staff officers and completed a site survey months ago and at the same time had several illegally parked EU HGV vehicles moved on as we discussed the ongoing problems. Highways and KCC action was completed last month with follow up correspondence promising further remedial actions after an audit was completed on ownership of areas in June and July on the wider area.

There have been incidents of people trafficking with individuals being dumped in these areas, sometimes as many as eighteen at a time, thus my determination for Lydden to be cleared of this criminal activity and endless abuse of Lydden village areas. The Police have continued to be very helpful with support from the previous and new Police Commissioners and their Area Superintendents.

Please also keep sending me photographs with any incidents of illegal parking, as I am unable to catch all of them before they move on or get reported, although I do my best.

Incidents of fly-tipping have been reported and cleared and the Lydden Hill roadside verges and hedges were finally cut back. The area now looks so much better and is safer.

DDC have now extended their grants deadline for both village environment and your village community groups - good news! Any support or help needed by any groups with DDC grant applications, please contact me and I am happy to support them. Simply email me Cllr-mark.rose@dover.gov.uk

After a vote to restore badly needed lighting on Whitifield Hill during the dark nights was approved, I am continuing to chase it up. It is intended that the lights will be replaced with LEDs, although meanwhile they have already been switched off/dismantled with no installation date announced for new LED lighting!

Not a good idea to to continue to keep us all in the dark, so I will be pushing for start dates.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR WOMEN BORN IN THE 50s (on or after 6/4/51)

There are over 4000 women born in the 50s in the Dover area affected by severe pension changes imposed by the Pension

Acts of 1995 and 2011 with little or no personal notification and who will not be receiving their pensions at 60.

Some women have only had two years notice of a six-year increase to their pension age, plunging them into huge financial hardship, with retirement plans shattered and costing them each in excess of £38k. Many of these women are already out of the labour market, caring for elderly relatives, providing childcare for grandchildren, or suffer discrimination in the workplace so struggle to find employment.

Women born in this decade are suffering financially. These women have worked hard, raised families and paid their tax and national insurance with the expectation that they would be financially secure when reaching 60.

It is not the pension age itself that is in dispute - it is widely accepted that women and men should retire at the same time. The issue is that the rise in the women's state pension age has been too rapid and has happened without sufficient notice being given to the women affected, leaving women with no time to make alternative arrangements.

I support the wish by these women to have the Government, not only reconsider the 2011 pension alteration which will dramatically affect the income of women who are either spinsters, divorced, separated or widowed, but to reverse the the change to reflect the pre 2011 decision.

Our society is becoming more and more dependent on 'carers' to look after people in their own homes, relieving the high financial costs of entering a care or nursing homes. Most elderly or infirm would rather remain in their own property.

The majority of carers are from the female sector of society, who take up this role once they retire. They look after their elderly members of family as debilitating mental or physical illness encroach on their lives, they also assist their younger members of their family with child care and may care for friends or neighbours.

If these women are having to continue working, who looks after these vulnerable sectors of society whilst these ladies have to work for up to another couple of years.

These ladies will have been fully paid up on their national insurance and should be entitled to draw their pensions pre 2011 change.

I am currently liaising with members of the woman's pension group with a view to taking this to Central Government to attempt to reverse the 2011 decision. The more the eligible woman born in the early 1950s sign up to "waspi" the more strength in numbers we will have to approach the Government.

Dear Editor

Phil Eyden is a researcher for Western Heights Preservation Society and has written two new books on Dover history; Dover's Western Heights in the First World War, and Dover's Forgotten Commando Raid.

During the First World War, three regiments defended Dover, the East Surrey and the East Kent regiments at the Western Heights and the Royal Fusiliers at the Castle. They also trained reinforcements for the Western Front. These will appear in regimental histories. The Dover Anti-Aircraft Corps would not. They were a civilian group hired by the Admiralty and were local men who for twenty months provided searchlight defence against Zeppelins but were useless against aeroplanes so they were disbanded and the defense taken over by the army. All 166 members of the Corps are listed . Since Dover is a highly stable society, descendants of these men are likely to still be here and these lads were obviously local heroes.

After several cancellations the raid on Hardelot finally took place on 21 April 1942. One hundred commandos, under the command of Lord Lovat, and fifty Canadians of the Carleton and York Regiment, under the command of Lt Ensor, set out for France carried there by the Royal Navy. The commandos who landed successfully, but in the wrong place and were under non-directed fire, sent out patrols and returned with only one casualty. The fifty Canadians waited offshore but navy navigation was weak, meaning the locality was uncertain, so they returned when the withdrawal signal was given by the main party.

The objective was to capture a prisoner, and destroy the searchlight and general reconnaissance. The later Dieppe disaster shows that lessons were not learned.

Phil Eyden has researched both military and civilian sources so that both books written by him are well illustrated and are well worth reading.

OFFICIAL OPENING OF KING GEORGE'S FIELD 3rd June 1936 (part two)

The new lay out provided for a capital cost of £1,125, of which the grant given was £775, leaving the Council to raise £350. To the credit of Temple Ewell (population under 1,000), the parishioners made an all-out drive and succeeded in raising this sum in eighteen months. In this connection special mention must be recorded of the generous donations of the following Temple Ewell organisations:- Day Schools, Women's Insitutue, Boy's Club, Church, District Conservative and Unionist Associations, School Managers, Temple Ewell Players, Temple Ewell Carollers, as well as the many private gifts.

Whilst the money was being gathered, estimates by four firms were invited and that by Messrs. Hodsons, Ltd., of Gravesend, was finally adopted and approved.

The provision of seats was not included in the original estimate, as they were considered a luxury, yet to enjoy the amenties of the playing field and the lovely surroundings of Temple Ewell, seats are very essential. It is, therefore, with pleasure that we have to record that of the eight seats required, one was presented by the Chairman and Councillors of Dover Rural District Council, in memory of the late George Hopkins, one by the members of the Women's Institute, one by the parishioners of Temple Ewell in memory of the late Lady of the Manor, Miss M. Watson; and the remaining five by W. Hollis, Esq., J.P., A Stanley, Esq., Major and Mrs. Mills, Mrs. Golden and Mrs. Hopkins.

In additon to the united efforts of the people, let us never forget our gratitude for the co-operation and help given by the Kent County Playing Fields Association and King George's Fields Foundation by their grant of £750.

Concerning the fund for the opening celebations, grateful thanks are due to the Temple Ewell Labour Party and many other kind friends.

On behalf of all funds one lady has been outstanding in her untiring devotion to the cause and, by example, inspired others to redouble their efforts, despite setbacks and opposition.

Editor's notes:

The lady in the final paragraph was not named in the programme. It goes on to detail the opening Programme of Events and Music. They 'kicked off' at 2.30pm with a reception of guests at the parish hall hosted by the Parish Council, followed by the Unveiling of Heraldic Panels and the Opening of the Gate by The Right Hon. Lord Luke.

The youth organisations were then presented to him, followed by some sports and

an afternoon tea. Interestingly for me, as current Admin Officer for Dover & Deal Sea Cadets, the Dover Sea Cadets then put on a P.T. display and during the course of the day their band played many tunes, including A Life on the Ocean Wave, Men of Harlech, My Bonnie Lies Over the Ocean and, strangely, Rudolph the Red Nose Reindeer, finishing with Beating the Retreat at 8pm. I'm sure a good day was had by all.

Some background info:

A King George's Field is a public open space in the United Kingdom dedicated to the memory of King George V (3 June 1865 – 20 January 1936).

In 1936, after the king's death, Sir Percy Vincent, the then Lord Mayor of London, formed a committee to determine a memorial that was not solely based on the idea of a statue. They arrived the same year at the concept of funding and erecting a single statue in London and setting up the King George's Fields Foundation to carry the late king's name forward through future generations.

The aim was to promote and to assist in the establishment throughout the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland of playing fields for the use and enjoyment of the people.

Each of the playing fields would be styled 'King George's Field' and were to be distinguished by heraldic panels or other appropriate tablet medallion or inscription commemorative of His Late Majesty and of a design



approved by the Administrative Council.

Money was raised locally to buy the land, with a grant made by the foundation. After purchase the land was passed to the National Playing Fields Association, to "preserve and safeguard the land for the public benefit". Land was still being acquired for the purpose during the 1950s and early 1960s.

When the King George's Fields Foundation was dissolved in 1965 there were 471 King George Playing Fields, all over the country. They are now owned by the National Playing

Fields Association and managed on their behalf by either the council or a board of local trustees.

There are strict covenants and conditions that ensure that the public will continue to benefit from these open play areas.
