



A MESSAGE OF 'THANKS' FROM BEN STOREY

Many of you will know Ben Story. He lived for many years in Templeside and is now one of the key members of Branching Out and is often seen with his friends supporting and helping others throughout Temple Ewell. Two years ago, motivated by Fresh Start, a free group organised by Dover District Council with the British Heart Foundation, Ben decided to try and lose weight. Over the next two years he was wholly committed to the cause. He soon lost 8 stone and then gradually another 4 stone. He was eating a healthy diet and exercising and is now hoping by Christmas to reach his target weight of 15 stone. The Fresh Start group now meet at the Sports Centre on a Tuesday evening and Ben continues to weigh in regularly. Ben's diet has included taking no sugar, not eating cakes, pastry or chocolate. At Easter he received a tray of Strawberries from Branching Out instead of chocolate! His '5 a day' is more like '10 a day' and includes spinach and a variety of fruit and vegetables. Ben's success and attitude to losing weight has inspired others. His guality of life has massively improved. His General health is good, blood pressure and cholesterol are stable and he is no longer breathless. He enjoys meeting his friends at the pub and 'shooting' pool. Ben has a 'fit bit' to engage in the 10,000 steps challenge except in the last three days he has 'stepped' 18,000, 17,000 and 13,000 respectively!

Ben's quality of life has been further enhanced by the opportunities afforded him by Branching Out. He attends the group in the Village Hall 4 day per week 9.30 to 3.30 and loves working on their Allotment. He and his friends help to keep the Churchyard tidy and are often seen helping organisations in the Village Hall. They regularly go on trip to such venues as Tides, Canterbury Tales and the Ski Slope in Folkestone. They continue to gain success with the Temple Ewell Gardeners and recently achieved 'best in show' for the Macaroons!

In all of this Ben has been overwhelmed by all of those wonderful family and friends who sponsored his weight loss. He had no idea that as he shed a 1lb here and 2lb there how much money was accumulating, he was just saying 'thank you' and putting it into a non-accessible savings pot! Imagine his surprise that when he 'broke' it open and there was a massive £535! His first reaction was to donate the money to Branching Out, the organisation that had encouraged, motivated and supported him in his commitment to lose weight and improve his health. BUT, as the photograph demonstrates Ben's wardrobe needed a complete makeover and he was encouraged to spend his well- earned sponsorship money on the 'new' Ben



As the country prepares for the 2018 World Cup, Kent Road Safety is launching its summer anti-drink-driving campaign. One in six fatal crashes involves a driver who has been drinking alcohol and over 50% of drink-drive collisions happen on urban roads.

Research reveals that over the last three years, August saw the most drink related collisions, with most crashes recorded between 10pm and 11pm. Half of all alcohol-related collisions occurred at the weekend and a quarter of all collisions occurred on a Saturday.

As the opportunities for drinking increase with longer summer days, people are encouraged to plan ahead and arrange alternative ways of getting home, whether by taxi or bus. If you get behind the wheel after even one drink, you're risking not only your life, but the lives of any road users you encounter. "The message is clear and simple – one drink is not worth the risk. Book a taxi or ensure you have a designated driver for the evening.

Serious penalties can be handed down to those convicted, with a driving ban of at least one year, an unlimited fine and, possibly, a prison sentence. If a drink driver is found guilty of causing death or serious injury the punishments are far higher, including living with the consequences of causing needless grief to others.

Chief Inspector Richard Smeed: "The message is simple – don't drive under the influence of alcohol.

Advice for motorists:

Beware the morning after - you could be over the legal limit many hours after your last drink, even if it's the 'morning after'. Sleep, coffee and cold showers don't help to sober you up.

There is no excuse for drink driving. Alcohol affects everybody's driving for the worse. It creates a feeling of overconfidence, makes judging distance and speed more difficult and slows your reactions so it takes longer to stop.

A large proportion of all drink drive crashes occur within three miles of the start of the journey.

If you're planning to drink alcohol, plan how to get home without driving -

Options include agreeing on a designated driver, saving a taxi number to your phone, or finding out about public transport routes and times before you go out.

Don't offer an alcoholic drink to someone you know is planning to drive

Even if you're not driving, you can help reduce the number of people who are killed and injured every year by drink driving.

Don't accept a lift from a driver you know has drunk alcohol

Consequences:

There are strict penalties if you are convicted of drink driving, including:

- A minimum 12 month driving ban
- A criminal record
- A hefty fine
- Up to 6 months in prison
- An endorsement on your licence for 11 years


However, this list does not reflect the everyday consequences of being caught drink driving which can include:

- Increase in car insurance costs
- Job loss
- Trouble getting in to countries like the USA
- The shame of having a criminal record
- Loss of independence



The Institute of Advanced Motorists calculate that a drink drive conviction could cost between $\pounds 20,000 - \pounds 50,000$ as a result of fines, solicitors fees, increase in car insurance and loss of job.



DDC 'Don't Be A Tosser' Campaign - Dover District Council continues to drive home the message to people not to drop litter from their vehicles, and is working to clear the roadsides, includ-

ing recent clearances on the A2 and A20, which collected over 15

tonnes of litter and debris. As part of a programme of litter clearance since April, they have also been clearing on Lydden Hill, Green Lane and Whitfield Hill, and working with partners Kent Highways on the A256 and A258. This follows news that the Council is backing a national campaign by Keep Britain Tidy, which sends out a blunt message to those motorists who thoughtlessly throw rubbish from their vehicles **'Don't be a Tosser'.**



Street cleaning, which includes clearing litter from roadsides, costs DDC in the region of £900,000 every year. They continue to drive home the message to motorists not to drop litter or throw rubbish from vehicles, including through their campaign **'Don't Dump in Dover District'**.

Russell Gardens - A nationally important garden

Russell Gardens is Grade II Listed in the English Heritage Register of Parks & Gardens of Special Historic Interest. It covers 10 hectares and is laid out in a formal style.

Originally known as Kearsney Court Park & Gardens, they were designed by the renowned Edwardian landscape architect, Thomas H. Mawson (1861-1933). Kearsney Court is believed to be one of the first independent commissions by Mawson, and is a very rare example of his work in the south east. Several set piece photographs of Kearsney Court were included in Mawson's book, The Art & Craft of Garden Making, which became a standard reference in its day.

The challenging steep terrain of the Alkham Valley provided Mawson with the ideal opportunity to create his signature design features - great terraces, pergolas and architectural features in a garden context.

The magnificent 170m long canal pond, and Palladian-style pergola bridges and boathouse pavilion form the central architectural features of the park.Russell Gardens was originally designed as part of a private country estate known as Kearsney Court. The estate was planned in 1899 for Alfred Leney (1837-1900), owner of the Phoenix Brewery in Dover. The project was sold on to Edward P Barlow, Chairman of the Wiggins Teape paper making business. Wiggins Teape maintained a paper mill in the town up until 2000.

It was Edward Barlow who commissioned Thomas H Mawson (1861-1933), the renowned Edwardian landscape architect and exponent of the Arts and Crafts Movement, to design the gardens.

On Barlow's death in 1912, the property passed to Mr Johnstone, a London newspaper man, and was later used as a nursing home and as a military hospital during World War II. After the war, 10 hectares of the estate were acquired by Dover Rural Council and it was opened as a public park in 1951. It was named Russell Gardens after Alderman Hilton Russell. The building of Kearsney Court is still privately owned.



Enjoy the countryside responsibly with your dog

- Don't panic or run if cattle follow you stay calm and walk guickly and guietly around the herd
- Remember cows can be protective of their young. Never get between cows and their calves – go around the herd and rejoin the path as soon as possible
- If you are threatened by cattle release your dog so you can both get to safety separately
- Dog poo can spread disease to farm animals. Bag it and bin it wherever you are, in any public waste bin
- For the health of your pet and farm animals, prevent your dog from getting into water troughs and follow your vet's advice on worming

LIVESTOCK UNDER ATTACK – KCAF supports NFU's campaign to #take the lead and asks dog owners to,

- use a lead near livestock when in the countryside
- keep their dogs secure at home

There is an increasing incidence of dog attacks on livestock. Thousands of sheep and cattle die as a consequence of injuries caused by dogs every year and livestock worrying costs the industry an estimated £1.6m*(NFU Mutual). But this figure is just the tip of the iceberg as many losses are uninsured and often unaccounted for.

Kent NFU Adviser Amanda Corp says: "The NFU is reminding people to keep dogs on a lead, rather than letting them run freely because livestock may be nearby. Dogs naturally have a chase instinct and they can inflict the most terrible bites on sheep which can die slowly and painfully of their injuries. Pregnant ewes can also abort their lambs if chased by dogs."

If a dog worries livestock, the dog owner or the person responsible for the animal at the time is guilty of an offence under the Animals Act 1971 and may be sued for compensation by the farmer or in certain cases the dog can be legally shot.

Ms Corp emphasises that sheep farming involves long-term husbandry, saying: "It takes two years of care and attention for a farmer to raise a sheep - from lamb to breeding ewe. It is therefore heartbreaking for a farmer when flocks are attacked by dogs. Even the smallest dog can injure a sheep, that's why it is so important to use a lead around livestock".

Note: There is a Government backed campaign to understand the true incidence of dog attacks. Please report livestock worrying incidents that you witness and cases of dogs that you know are not secured adequately at home. Phone Kent Police on 101 – they will welcome your call.

Friends, and family, are so very important to me. Some, sadly, have come and gone, some to Heaven. Communication is the main key, I have found.


Compatibility, sharing the same opinions and views, enjoying the very same things. Keeping in touch will always comfort and amuse, I have found.
