Mothering Sunday			

Easter is very late this year (April 21st) but on March 6th we begin our preparation for it as Lent begins. Lent is the period of 40 days which comes before Easter in the Christian calendar and it begins on Ash Wednesday, when we hold a special service, this year at Lydden. (If you haven't visited Lydden Church before, do join us, it is totally unique – a beautiful ancient building surrounded by fields, horses and sheep!) Lent is a season of reflection and preparation before the celebrations of Easter and by observing the 40 days of Lent, Christians replicate Jesus Christ's sacrifice and withdrawal into the desert for 40 days.

Christian churches use Lent as a time for prayer and penance. Some Christians surrender something such as a habit or favourite food, but it is also a time to take up things, such as daily meditation or attending additional church services. You may want to join us at a church service which gives the opportunity to step away from the pressures of today's world and have quiet time for reflection. Whatever you choose to do, it is a reflection of Jesus' deprivation in the wilderness and a test of self-discipline.

On the fourth Sunday of Lent we celebrate Mothering Sunday. Traditionally, it was a day when children, mainly daughters, who had gone to work as domestic servants were given a day off to visit their mother and family. Today it is a day when children give presents, flowers, and home-made cards to their mothers, and we always enjoy our lovely all age service that day as the children take part – their singing in Latin is really impressive!

Lent allows us to begin anew. This 40-day period is a perfect time to repent and start over. The beauty of the Christian faith is forgiveness, and Lent is a wonderful season that gives us many opportunities to reflect, slow down, give more and proclaim Christ's love to the world. Happy Lent!

HOW DO I GET FAITH?

What we believe can sometimes get in the way of how we feel. We may believe that we should love other people but we do not think this should include the idiot who cuts us up on the motorway. We feel restrained by our own ethical code. Our conscience is dictated by what we believe, although against our natural instincts.

Mostly, however, belief is of real benefit. It provides a structure or a skeleton on which our thoughts and actions are based. Some may ask "Is it just a psychological crutch?" It undoubtedly serves that purpose but it is not self supporting and needs to be based on something more substantial.

Jesus always taught that those who were convinced of their own spiritual health would not be interested in him. He said "It is not the healthy who need a doctor." Many have no faith by choice, but others are wistful, and would say "I wish I had Your Faith". The response is "BUT YOU CAN." The hearer is often unconvinced. How do they think faith comes about? Is it something you are born with? Some added chromosome that some people have? Is it the home that you are brought up in? There are many believing parents with non believing children and believing children with non believing parents.

It does appear that some people find it easy to believe whilst others are more sceptical. Some people think that faith is the unthinking acceptance of things we cannot possibly understand. The Bible never asks us to have faith in someone we can know nothing about. In fact it is quite the opposite. It encourages us to trust in someone that we can know about. It is much easier to believe in someone that we have had some contact with. In his Gospel John writes "Jesus did many other miraculous signs which are written that you may believe (or have faith in) Jesus as the Christ, the Son of God and that by believing you may have life in his name.

Thanet Community Transport Association

A representative of this organisation attended the January meeting of the Parish Council to talk about the services on offer. The name is a bit of a mis-nomer as the service covers the whole South East corner of Kent, not only Thanet.

The quoted aim is "to achieve a strong, viable and sustainable Community Transport Service in East Kent that will promote community engagement and thereby empower individuals and groups to participate fully and effectively in the wider community".

Put simply, what this means is that people who would otherwise be unable to access public transport because of age or disability or because public transport is unavailable for their journey can use the service in a similar way to using a taxi, but it would cost less.

To use the dial a ride service you need to confirm

- 1. That you live more than 500 metres from the nearest bus stop or
- 2. You are unable to use existing public services
- 3. You are elderly or disabled

How to Join

Everyone has to become a member of the service before they can use the transport. However the Parish Council agreed at the meeting to pay for a group membership, to enable any parishioners to join without having to pay a fee. Details are available from the Parish Council.

What services are Provided?

Dial a ride - this is a door to door sevice to assist elderly and disabled people to go shopping or to medical appointments and who are unable to travel with a conventional bus service. There may be many reasons a conventional bus cannot be used, bus stop too far to walk, unable to carry shopping, cannot board a conventional bus.

Trips - any of our service users can go on any of the trips that we provide, pub lunches, afternoon teas, fish and chip suppers, shopping to larger complexes, theatres and places of interest. These can be booked in advance. A quarterly newsletter is sent to each member.

Holidays - we provide transport for short breaks to destinations such as Eastbourne, Worthing, Bournemouth and Norfolk. Our vehicles transport you door

to door and stay with you to take you on day trips whilst you are away.

Day Centres - We provide transport to and from day centres for groups and individuals. The transport is door to door and arrives at a suitable time for you.

Group Transport - Voluntary and charitable organisations can book a trip of their choice.

Shopping - Many people are no longer able to do their own shopping. We provide a personal shopper to collect your list and go to the supermarket of your choice and get your shopping and then return it to you.

Safety of Wheelchairs

We are able to transport our service users in wheelchairs as long as the wheelchair has been crash tested and is mechanically safe.

All members of staff are trained to check wheelchairs prior to travel and refuse a wheelchair if it is not crash tested and safe to travel in.

There are some simple checks that will be carried out prior to travel.

Transport Staff

The staff are all trained to a high standard and are caring and helpful. Prior to them starting work they have to have a DBS certificate.

The training they receive includes:-

Driving training Passenger assistant training First Aid Manual handling Safeguarding PCV Licence Induction course Wheelchair training

Blue badge cheat faces £750 bill after Counter Fraud Team prosecution. Kent County Council's Counter Fraud Team has secured its first prosecution as it cracks down on blue badge misuse in the county.

Laura Halford, of Watling Street, Dartford, appeared before magistrates where she admitted fraudulently using her grandmother's blue badge to park in disabled parking spaces. The 31-year-old was convicted and must pay costs of £750 after pleading guilty to four counts of fraud.

Under the rules governing the blue badge scheme, it is a criminal offence for a badge-holder or anyone else to misuse the badge and doing so will probably result in a £1,000 fine, the confiscation and possible permanent loss of the badge. The authority's civil enforcement officers issued her with a penalty charge notice after CCTV footage showed Halford parked in Buckhurst car park on January 2, 2018. Halford admitted false representation for the display of a blue badge and possession of an article for use in the course or connection of a fraud.

Paul Rock, Counter Fraud Manager, said: "The vast majority of Blue Badges in Kent are used correctly and where there is an allegation of misuse we will investigate. As a council, our focus is on correcting behaviour through education and working with district and borough councils to ensure compliance. We take blue badge fraud extremely seriously and there will be more prosecutions expected in the near future."

The day to day enforcement of the scheme in Kent is undertaken by district, borough and city council parking enforcement officers. More serious allegations of misuse, such as suspected application fraud, forged or counterfeit badges and persistent misuse are referred to KCC's Counter Fraud Team to investigate. This team sits within internal audit and deals with all fraud and similar crimes affecting the council, including blue badge misuse.

In cases where there is strong evidence of misuse, the suspects are interviewed or if there is strong evidence of dishonesty, then KCC proceeds with a prosecution. Parking in a disabled bay without displaying a blue disabled badge, just because it is conveniently close to a supermarket entrance, will also attract similar attention.

Since April 2018 the service has received more than 130 reports of misuse. In response. One has to realise that misusing a blue badge or falsely obtaining a blue badge is a criminal offence, for the unlawful user often obtains a "pecuniary advantage" by frequently obtaining parking for up to three hours or more in restricted areas where non blue badge holders would possibly incur a parking charge.

Once the fraudulent user is convicted of a disabled badge offence, it does not end there. If they fail to declare the conviction (which also includes a caution) when applying for car, house and many other insurances, then once more the applicant could commit a further criminal offence by obtaining insurance at a lower rate, than had they declared their criminal conviction.

The criminal conviction could also affect certain job applications or would have to be declared to their current bosses and often recent criminal offences can affect ones entry to certain countries in the Far East and the USA to name a few, creating a problem for holiday makers!

In order to help tackle abuse or blue badge fraud, residents who see a badge being misused are asked to inform KCC by reporting it online at the kent.gov.uk blue badge page.
