Hello All

Easter this year is the latest it has been since 2011, when it was 24th April. I've often wondered why it falls on a different date every year, so looked it up and this is what I found:



The predominant reason why Easter falls on a different date each year is because we now use the solar, Gregorian calendar rather than a lunar one. This means the full moon occurs on different dates each year, and therefore so does Easter. Dr Greg Brown, astronomer at the Royal Observatory Greenwich, said Easter is based on a combination of the seven-day week and the cycle of the phases of the Moon. "The March equinox is the date when the sun crosses from the southern hemisphere of the sky to the northern hemisphere marking the beginning of spring. "The day and night of the equinox are of approximately equal length. As neither the calendar year (365 days) nor the cycle of the phases of the Moon (29.5 days) divide evenly by the seven-day week, the date of Easter Sunday can move irregularly by up to a month, from between late March and late April."

So, clear as mud now! My most memorable Easter was the year my youngest son was born - Good Friday 1976. It was 16th April and also memorable because we had a heatwave that year for the second year running.

Whatever you're doing I hope you all have a lovely Easter and that the weather is kind to us for the Holiday weekend.

For the special services from Thursday to Saturday we will be joined in Temple Ewell by our friends from Lydden Church. Everyone is welcome to all services, although Easter Day is always an especially joyful service.

Holy Week is the name given to the week beginning on Palm Sunday and ending on Easter Sunday. Holy Week is when the church remembers the last week of Jesus' life and is the most intense week of the year for Christians.

On Palm Sunday Jesus arrived in Jerusalem to crowds and cheers. His triumphant entry into Jerusalem has been celebrated on the Sunday before Easter since the first centuries of Christianity. We celebrate this in Temple Ewell too as we process through the village with palm crosses and hopefully a pony instead of a donkey!

Maundy Thursday gets its name from the Latin word mandare meaning to command. We remember Jesus' command: 'Love one another as I have loved you'. At the Last Supper Jesus washed the disciples' feet. This is not only an important reminder of the nature of Jesus, but also the kind of service we are meant to demonstrate in our love for one another, and we remember it with foot washing during our service.

Good Friday is the day when Christians remember the crucifixion and death of Jesus Christ. It is a sombre day where churches meet, pray and reflect on the sacrifice Jesus willingly paid for all our sins.

For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

The Easter Eve is the first service of Easter and is celebrated on the evening of Holy Saturday (the day before Easter Day). We gather outside the church waiting around a fire for the resurrection of Jesus on Easter morning, and this is represented visually by a large Easter candle, which is lit from the fire and brought into a darkened church. This depiction of new life and light represents Jesus' resurrection on the first Easter morning. The congregation then light their own candles from the Easter candle, representing their own new life as followers of Jesus. The Easter Vigil is generally a quiet and thoughtful service, but one full of reassurance.

Easter Day service is one of joy and celebration.

Easter is a time of renewal, and whilst it can be easy to renew things outwardly, for example our clothes, our appearance, renewal on the inside can be more difficult. After realising that Jesus had risen from the dead the disciples were transformed from the inside with an inner strength and the need to share their beliefs with the world. Today that first Easter still offers hope and as we enjoy eggs and rabbits this spring, that message is still worth pondering.

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COURIER FRAUD - BEWARE

Kent Police have advised that they are seeing between 10 and 15 attempts of this type of Fraud in the Dover area each week at present.

Victims are on average 70 years old and lose between £7500 and £10000.

Fraudsters cold call you pretending to be from your bank or from the police. They claim there is an issue with your bank account or request your assistance with an ongoing bank or police investigation. The ultimate aim of this call is to trick you into parting with your money either in person, online, via a money service bureau or in a bank. They may even ask you to buy high value goods, foreign currency or gift cards such as iTunes.

How it works:

Criminals call you claiming to be from the police or fraud department of your bank. They claim they are conducting an investigation, often saying it involves corrupt bank employees or police and ask for your help or say your account is at risk. If they manage to convince you, they instruct you to carry out a task which effectively involves you handing over your money. These include:

Asking you to attend your bank branch to withdraw a large sum of money which they will then collect from you for evidence. They may claim the money may be counterfeit, or that it is going to be sent off for forensic or fingerprint analysis.

Asking you to withdraw large amounts of foreign currency, which will similarly be collected by a courier from your home address.

Asking you to provide details over the phone, including typing in your PIN then handing over your cards to a courier sent to your address (often after you have cut them up as instructed).

Asking you to purchase high value items, such as expensive watches to 'clear criminal funds which will again be collected by a courier.

Please be aware that neither the Police nor your Bank will ever ask you for your PIN number.

This is sadly just one of many different types of Fraud that Criminals will try to use to get their hands on our hard earned money. More information can be obtained by going to www.actionfraud.police.uk and reading the "Little Book of Big Scams". Copies are also available at most Banks.

High energy bills a pain in the neck?







Why not find out if you could get a better energy tariff? Energy Deal, Dover District Council's Collective Energy Switching Scheme is free to join and gives residents the chance to make an informed decision about switching energy suppliers in a safe, and supported environment without any obligation to switch.

Auctions are held 3 times a year (February, May and October). The next auction will be on 21 May 2019 with registration opening on 2 April 2019.

How can I take part?

- Online at www.dover.gov.uk/Environment/Energy-Advice/Cut-Energy-Bills
- Residents without internet access can call 01304 872428 (you will receive a callback)
- Registration only takes a few minutes and is completely obligation free You will receive your personal offer
- You decide if you want to accept your offer and switch

If you've previously taken part in the scheme you'll need to re-register each time you wish to take part.

How does the collective switch work?

- Energy suppliers are invited to take part in the auction to bid against each other to offer the best deal. The Spring auction takes place on 21 May 2019
- The winning supplier will be the one making the lowest offer
- Your personal energy offer is based on the energy usage information you provided. You are not obliged to take up the offer: it is your choice
- If you decide to accept the offer you need to do so before 2 July 2019
- The entire switch is taken care of for you, meaning the whole thing is as smooth and hassle-free for you as possible

The recent Winter Auction (held in February) secured tariffs not available direct from the supplier or through price comparison services. Both online (Octopus Energy (100% renewable energy)) and paper billing tariffs (E.ON) were between £270 and £282 lower than the standard tariff cap (based on Ofgem average consumption figures).

March into Spring with a Free Health MOT

"NHS One You teams" are currently busy with a series of special events across Kent, providing free on-the-spot Health Checks and health 'MOTs' in local venues including high streets and shopping centres.

Kent Community Health NHS Foundation Trust's One You advisors are teaming up with 'WellbeingPeople' this month to offer Health Checks in Gravesend, Maidstone, Canterbury, Dover, Folkestone and the Isle of Sheppey. Figures for these areas show that they have some of the county's highest levels of heart failure and disease. Cancer, heart and lung disease also account for a large percentage of premature deaths (under the age of 75) in these districts while stroke is another major health issue.

Health experts advise that prevention, and spotting and managing the early warning signs such as high blood pressure, is an important part of how we can help people to look after their own health. While many people will already be receiving treatment from their doctor and local health services, it's feared others may be unaware of potential health issues.

If you are aged 40 to 74 years old and with no relevant pre-existing conditions, you can sign up for a free NHS Health Check for advice on keeping yourself healthy and active. Your blood pressure, height and weight will be checked. You will be given a small finger prick test to check your blood cholesterol and you'll also be asked some questions about your lifestyle and family history. The check will identify the risk of you developing heart disease, kidney disease, diabetes or dementia in the future.

Mark Cummings, One You Locality Manager for Kent Community Health NHS Foundation Trust (KCHFT) said: "We know that some people don't like to go to the GP, so our One You Roadshows are helping people across Kent to get a free NHS Health Check in a convenient location; or some simple lifestyle advice to support them to make the change to a healthier lifestyle. We're really grateful to all of our venues for hosting us this month – particularly Morrison's who have been especially helpful."

Health Checks are led by KCHFT and commissioned by Kent County Council. A series of events were carried out in Thanet and Swale earlier this year. Andrew Scott-Clark, KCC's Director of Public Health, said: "There are many people suffering from debilitating conditions and reaching the end of their life prematurely which is a tragedy as many of these conditions and premature deaths can be prevented

through simple lifestyle changes such as quitting smoking, reducing how much alcohol you drink and increasing physical activity." He added: "High blood pressure and high cholesterol often cause no symptoms whatsoever, so unless you have a check you won't know you have them. High blood pressure can trigger an irregular heartbeat which increases the risk of a stroke. If you know that you are at risk, there are services that can help you to get on the right track."

Easter Recipe

Malted milk blondies



PREP: 20 MINS COOK: 35 MINS

plus 2 hrs setting

A dessert full of white chocolate and Maltesers is the stuff dreams are made of. One seriously good looking blondie to slice and share this Easter

EASY

* undecorated after baking

Nutrition: per serving

Ingredients

180g butter, melted, plus extra for the tin

250g light brown sugar

3 medium eggs

75g malted milk drink powder

200g plain flour

1 tsp baking powder

103g bag Maltesers, plus MaltEaster Bunnies to decorate

50g white chocolate, melted, for drizzling (optional)



Method

1. Heat oven to 180C/160C fan/ gas 4, butter a 20 x 20cm brownie tin and line the base with parchment. Mix the melted butter with the sugar, beating until smooth, then beat in the eggs. Add the malted milk powder, flour and baking powder, stir to just combine, then fold in the Maltesers. Spoon the mixture into the prepared tin and bake for 30 mins until cooked around the outside but still wobbly in the middle.
