The sorrow and joy of Holy Week have passed, and we thank all who took part in our services, and in making the church look beautiful for Easter Day. May is a relatively quiet month for us as we look forward to celebrating the birthday of the church at Pentecost.

One of the best-known stories of the days that followed Jesus' resurrection is about "Doubting Thomas", a name often applied to those who choose not to believe something. Jesus' disciples are gathered when their resurrected rabbi shows up, but one of the twelve, Thomas, was not present to witness it. A week later the disciples were again in the house, and this time Thomas was with them. The doors were shut and Jesus appeared a second time. He invites Thomas to put his fingers in the wounds, and the doubting disciple exclaims that he now believes.

Many of us have doubts over things – it's not always obvious why we choose what we believe, and we are encouraged to be mindful of others' beliefs as it is very easy to criticise when others have different views from us. But in current times, we hear so much about fake news on social media and in the press, as well as email and phone scams, that we need to seriously consider what we choose to take to heart and what we ignore or challenge. False news stories spread faster, deeper and farther than true stories, cascading across newspapers, and from 'host' to 'host' across Twitter hashtags, WhatsApp groups and your great-uncle Fred's Facebook page. To make things worse, a fake story is tenaciously persistent.

We recently discussed this at our regular Housegroup meeting (which provides us the opportunity to question and challenge our religious beliefs) and agreed that it can be frustrating to be sent fake story after fake story by friends on Facebook, and to read newspaper articles that never brush shoulders with fact. It is our responsibility to dig deeper into stories and sources, and to question what we read in order to try and understand the truth. For Thomas, it was relatively easy to go from doubting to believing – he saw Jesus and felt his wounds – but for us, we need to be diligent and make an effort to get to the truth. It can be hard work but it will also be satisfying and ultimately, our relationships and peace of mind depend on it.



Works update

Work to the café extension in Kearsney Abbey is continuing and the installation of the steel frame and roof structure is well underway. The services connections for drainage have now been completed. A temporary roof has been constructed over the old billiard room to protect the building while work takes place on the roof and lantern.

The landscape contractors are due to start work shortly. Some pathways and access routes will be affected while work takes place. There may be times when certain areas of the park need to be closed off temporarily, for the safety of both contractors and the public. We will clearly signpost these areas and updates will be posted on the park noticeboards.

Wildlife surveys

Over the next few months, we'll be doing reptile surveys in Kearsney Abbey to find out more about the lizards, slow-worms and other reptiles that may be in the park. Shelters, known as refugia, have been placed around the park and will be monitored regularly. If you'd like to volunteer to help us out, please email us.

Temple Ewell Parish Council

I regret that the Parish Council Elections due to take place on 2nd May have had to be postponed, as the number of nominations for Councillors was insufficient to allow a legally constituted Council

to be established.

The timing of the revised Parish Council Elections and associated period for Nominations has yet to be finalised by the DDC Elections Team, in part due to the ongoing uncertainty (at the time of writing this article) around Brexit and the need for European Parliament Elections to be held on 23 May. It is most likely that the new period for Nominations to become a Parish Councillor will be a two week period in mid-May, with the Election scheduled for either 30 May or 6 June.

There are 12 positions available for Temple Ewell Parish Council, albeit it has been operating on just 9 for a while, and added to this one existing Councillor is about to move away from the Parish, and the long-time Chairman, Colin Smithen has decided to retire. There is now therefore a great opportunity for any Parishioner to have a real say in what goes on in and around Temple Ewell in relation to things such as Planning, Highways and Footpaths, and the Environment, as well as the special village events that usually take place in July & December.

Meetings are normally the last Tuesday of the month, starting at 7.15pm and usually last no more than 90 minutes. There are ten meetings per annum (no meetings in August & December), and while it is desirable that Councillors attend each meeting, it is understood that on occasions there will be other priorities.

No experience is needed to stand for elections as a Councillor, but you do have to be on the Register of Electors, and must reside within the Parish, or within 3 miles of the Parish boundary. To stand as a candidate, a form known as a Nomination Paper must be completed (contains details of the candidate's name and address) and this needs to be attested by a Proposer and Seconder. The form must then be lodged with the DDC Election Team prior to the deadline. More information can be found on the DDC Website under "Elections". I am also more than happy to try to deal with any queries you may have.

It would be really great to have some new faces and fresh ideas, so now is the time to seize the opportunity, and help with the running of your community! The full Parish Council meets on the last Tuesday of the month (excluding August and December) at 7.15pm at the Temple Ewell Baptist Church Hall on the corner of the High Street and London Road. Parishioners are most welcome to attend and contribute to meetings.

The agenda and minutes are displayed on the Parish Council notice board by Southdown Stores and on the Council website. Should you wish to put anything on the notice board please contact either the Clerk or the Chairman.




Dover Choral Society Concert

Kent County Councillor

Leading family history website, Findmypast, has today announced the online publication of thousands of original parish registers in partnership with Kent County Council.

The new records have been created from more than 3,000 handwritten registers currently held at the Kent History and Library

Centre in Maidstone. These registers have been scanned and digitised in full colour to ensure the highest possible image quality. More than 2.6 million fully-indexed baptism, wedding banns, marriage and burial records spanning more than 400 years of Kent history are now available to search online exclusively.

By improving access to these rich documents and making them searchable for the first time, Findmypast will provide family historians from around the world with even more opportunities to discover their Kent based ancestors. Researchers can now uncover details of their families past and add new generations to their family tree with greater ease than ever before. Today's release builds on an existing partner-ship between Findmypast and KCC Archives which already has resulted in the online publication of more than 2.5 million Canterbury Archdeaconry records held by the Canterbury Cathedral Archives. These new additions join Findmypast's Canterbury collection and existing collections of Kent Family History Society records to form the most comprehensive online repository of Kent parish registers in the word.

Findmypast's UK Data Strategy Manager, Paul Nixon, said: "Now with more than 5 million indexed parish register entries for Kent, Findmypast really is the only show in town if your ancestors had put down roots in the Garden of England. We're thrilled to be working with the Kent History & Library Centre."

Six signs of summer

Trees in full leaf

The woodland canopy has closed over and the trees are lovely and green.

Summer flowers blooming

Spring flowers such as bluebells are fading fast, to be replaced by summer blooms. Look out for honeysuckle, foxgloves, poppies and common spotted orchids in woodland and along hedgerows. Honeysuckle is especially sweet smelling and bees, butterflies and moths love to feed on its nectar. Did you know that its scent is strongest at night, and moths can detect it a quarter of a mile away?

Fledglings learning to fly

At this time of year, baby birds are beginning to leave the nest. Many spend a few days on the ground before they're ready to take flight. Sometimes people think they've fallen out of the nest and try to rescue them, when really the parent bird is watching nearby.

If you see a baby bird on its own, it's best to leave it alone. However, if it's on a busy path or road, you can move it a short distance to a safer place. Make sure it's within hearing distance of its parents though. If you find one in your garden and you have a cat, keep your cat inside until the bird has flown away.

Butterflies all aflutter

Woodlands and gardens come alive with delicate, colourful butterflies fluttering over the nectar-rich flowers. You can attract even more of these beautiful creatures to your garden or window ledge by rustling up a sweet treat: Just add ¼ cup of sugar to 2 cups of water and heat it up in a saucepan until the sugar has dissolved. Leave it to cool, then soak a brightly-coloured sponge in the mixture and put the soggy sponge on a plate near some flowers.

Bats on the wing

Bats give birth in June so they're pretty busy hunting for insects to provide food. A summer evening is a great time to spot them darting and swooping through the air. You're most likely to see them in woodlands and near rivers or ponds.

Stag beetles out and about

One insect the bats won't be catching is the stag beetle. These huge, black creatures measure 30-75cmm long – and the male looks like it has huge antlers on its head, although they're actually its jaws!

Stag beetles spend several years underground as larvae before emerging to breed at around the beginning of June. They're one of our most endangered insects so, if you see one on the pavement, you should pick it up gently by its middle and move it to a safe place.



I have just received my copy of T.E. Newsletter. Reading the article Village Life, I find another element is missing from what constitutes a village.


