Temple Ewell 10K Race

Andy Stevens conquers the adverse conditions to win the inaugural DFDS Temple Ewell 10K Run.

The 2019 DFDS Temple Ewell 10K Run benefitted from a perfect autumn morning on Sunday 13th October. However, runners did have to contend with treacherous conditions underfoot caused by heavy rain throughout the previous week. This new multi terrain race attracted nearly 300 runners of varying standards and although fast times were hard to come by, Andy Stevens from Thanet Road Runners trotted round the course in a great time of 38mins and 31secs. Second place went to Ben McGhee of Deal Tri Club in 39mins and 53secs, who established an early lead but was pegged back and overtaken by Stevens at the 4k mark. Close behind came Kevin Hart of Dover Road Runners who finished 3rd in 40mins and 16secs.

The ladies race quickly became a 2 horse race with Becks Macey of Ashford & District Road Runners finally winning in 47mins and 00sec. She moved away in the final kilometres from Abigail Cardwell of Thanet Road Runners who finished second in 47mins and 49secs. Third place was won by another Ashford and District Road Runners athlete, Essen Larsen, in a time of 50mins and 27 secs. This new race had its HQ in Kearsney Abbey and started in Lower Road, Temple Ewell. It then rose onto the Minnis and took a figure of eight route around Ewell Minnis, before descending Scotland Common Road and finishing in Russell Gardens. The organisers are grateful to DFDS Ferries for sponsoring the race and their agreement to make this a 3 year involvement.

The race was raising money for Temple Ewell School PTFA and the prizes of trophies and DFDS ferry vouchers were presented by DFDS Vice President Kaspar Moos and Head Teacher of Temple Ewell C of E Primary School, Angela Matthews. The race was started by former Olympic Marathon runner Barry Watson, who gave the runners a few words of wisdom before the start. Barry was a former teacher at Temple Ewell School.

There were also various age group winners as follows : Men V40 Ashley Day (Unattached) 40m 40sec Men V50 Edward Crockett (Deal Tri Club) 43m 33sec Men V60 Mark Sluman (Dover Road Runners) 47m 20sec Men V70 Dave Martin (Deal Tri Club) 1hr 00m 02sec

Ladies V35 Rachel Tappenden (Dover Road Runners) 51m 42sec Ladies V45 Abi Coleman (Dover Road Runners) 52m 05sec Ladies V55 Vicky Talbot Rosner (Invicta East Kent AC) 53m 14sec Ladies V65 Barbara Hunt (South Kent Harriers) 1hr 22m 17sec This year there was not a team prize but the race was well represented by local clubs, particularly Dover Road Runners who are based close by.

Joint Race Director Glenn Mousley said : "the race ran smoothly despite the wet conditions underfoot. We spent a considerable amount of time on the course the day before, spreading straw to improve grip for the runners and this paid off with some excellent performances. It is a new race and we were really pleased with the support given from local runners. We look forward to welcoming them back next year."

Gift Day happened on Saturday 12th October, in spite of grey skies and continual drizzle! It turned out to be a very sociable occasion and so a big thank you to everyone who made the time pass quickly by stopping for a chat and of course, who handed us an envelope. At this first count we have over £1,100 and usually find more donations continue to come in at later stages, so what a worthwhile morning and what a great village to live in. It greatly supports our Church.

Our recent Harvest Thanksgiving felt to be a real celebration, with children from Sunday Club doing readings and prayers as well as a very interesting presentation. Here is one of their prayers,

For the promise of harvest contained within a seed, we thank you. For the oak tree within an acorn, the bread within a grain, the apple within a pip. The mystery of nature, gift wrapped for us to sow, we thank you.

This was followed by a relaxed and enjoyable lunch, organised by Alison. We do thank the school and parents for their very generous donation of gifts that decorated the church but then, importantly, have gone to support our local Food Bank.

Friday November 1st is All Saints Day or the day of All Hallows and so October 31st is "All Hallow's Eve" or Halloween. Under Christians Together in Dover six churches in the Dover area are providing Light Parties for families, from 4.30pm – 6.00pm. This is an alternative event for the usual Halloween practice of "Trick or Treating." There are more details under Sunday Club if you are interested.

Saturday November 2nd is All Souls' Day when churches remember and pray for the souls of all departed. November 3rd is a service for All Saints when Darren Miller, the Archdeacon of Ashford will be celebrating a special service at Lydden. Coincidentally All Saints is occurring at the same time that an English person has been made a Saint in almost 50 years. Cardinal John Newman was described at the Vatican as "cheerful, easy, kind, courteous, candid and unassuming", two miracles are also attributed to him. There are numerous Saints acknowledged for so many different reasons, through courage, living a holy life, their actions in helping many people.

Interestingly Dismos, the thief on the cross beside Jesus, who said that he and the other criminal who had taunted Jesus deserved to die since they had committed evil deeds where Jesus had done nothing wrong. Dismos asked Jesus to remember him when He was in His kingdom. Jesus assured him that together they would be in paradise that day, so Dismos became a Saint.

For Temple Ewell Church, St Peter is a wonderful figure. He was a fisherman, quite rough and ready, and lacking any formal education. Yet he was chosen by Jesus to be the "rock" on which the church would be built across the world. Peter challenged Jesus at times and also denied him but Jesus trusted him to be strong and true. He holds the keys of heaven, one gold, reflecting power in the kingdom of the heavens and the silver key representing the spiritual authority of the church on earth.

St Paul, having persecuted many Christians was famously converted on the road to Damascus. Paul was born in Tarsus and was a tent maker by trade, but was a Roman citizen who pursued education. His personal letters to many Christians represent his beliefs and version of events, and he's the hero of the Acts of Apostles. He travelled tens of thousands of miles around the Mediterranean spreading the word of Jesus.

It seems appropriate to end with the words of Saint Augustine of Hippo (354 -430). Lord, I entrust the past to your mercy, the present to your love and the future to your providence.

Welcome to my latest newsletter report for the Parish Council. The autumn has hit us with a vengeance, with such a lot of wet weather recently. However it is still guite warm so can't complain

too much. Our next Parish Council meeting will be taking place on the 29th October and all parishoners are welcome.

Also, by the time you read this newsletter, Parish Councillors will have met to discuss website improvements and our move into the 21st Century with a development of a Social Media strategy.

My main focus for the past few weeks has been helping to organise the Temple Ewell 10K Run, which took place on the 13th October. This run which started in Lower Road and finished in Russell Gardens, attracted around 300 athletes of varying abilities, from all over Kent, to the village. It was great to see so many people enjoying the race and the large number of complimentary social media posts that have been received since. The race was a great success and thanks to DFDS Ferries for agreeing to sponsor the race. The race has raised over \pounds 4,000 for the school PTFA and will now be an annual event. Please find the report for the race separately in the newsletter.

We continue our endeavors to get some traffic calming at the junction of London Road, High Street and Templeside. The latest is that the Clerk (Andy) and I have to complete what is known as a HIP (Highways Improvement Plan) which we can then go to Kent Highways with and use this as a basis for some improvements. One group particularly affected is school children who live in the Templeside part of the village being unable to cross the London Road safely, resulting in extra trips for parents and more cars in the village.

Progress has been made by the Parish Council events committee, who are getting ready for the annual Christmas Lights turn on the 1st December and we will once again be having the Betteshanger Colliery Band and Santa Claus to entertain us. The 75th Anniversary VE Day Celebration next May will be a collaboration between Parish Council, Newsletter and other interested parties in the village with the first meeting planned soon.

Parish Council members recently attended a new initiative organised by new District Councillor David Beaney, with a collaborative meeting between various local Parish Councils. This was very productive and showed that we share common problems and can collectively work together help solve these better.

In 1920 Mary was asked to create a comic strip as a rival to the comic strips in the Daily Mail and Daily Mirror.

Mary created the popular Rupert Bear, co-writing the adventures with her husband. Herbert died in 1931 and Mary continued the comic strip alone until she retired in 1935. Various illustrators and writers continue Mary's work and children of all ages can still enjoy his stories.

Rupert will be 100 in 2020. It was a most interesting and informative talk. Who knew that Mary lived, died and is buried so near to us?

'Every Mind Matters' campaign underway in Kent

Kent is supporting the national 'Every Mind Matters' campaign this World Mental Health Day by reminding residents of the support services available across the county. Launched by Public Health England, 'Every Mind Matters' is the first

national NHS mental health campaign encouraging adults to be more aware of their mental health and helps them to discover simple steps to look after their mental health and wellbeing.

It offers a range of useful resources that help spot the signs of common mental health concerns, provides practical self-care tips and guidance and, importantly, explains when to seek further support. There is also a free NHS-approved online tool which helps people build an action plan to deal with stress and anxiety, boost their mood, improve their sleep and help them feel more in control. The tool and information of Kent support services can be found at: www.kent.gov.uk/everymindmatters.

KCC's Director of Public Health, Andrew Scott-Clark said: "The 'Every Mind Matters' campaign is starting a national conversation which we will be supporting with partners in Kent. By encouraging people across the county to join that conversation, we want to support our residents to feel more confident in taking action to take care of their mental health and wellbeing. There is no single solution to this but by promoting a range of self-care actions to promote good mental health and tackle common problems, as well as signposting the wider resources and services for those in greater need which are available in Kent, we hope the conversation will go far and wide."

One of the support services commissioned by KCC is Live Well Kent which provides a free, person centred, holistic service that supports people to manage issues in life that impact on their mental health and wellbeing. It is open to any Kent residents aged 17 or older. Shaw Trust is the strategic partner providing the service in the West Kent, with Porchlight providing the service in east Kent. The service is funded by joint commissioners Kent County Council and the seven clinical commissioning groups for Kent (but not Medway).

Live Well Kent works in partnership with clinical services providing an alternative which is focussed on wellbeing, connectivity, prevention and recovery. It is based on open referrals – anyone can access help when they need it – for more details, go to www.livewellkent.org.uk or call 0800 567 7699.

Meanwhile, the theme of this year's World Mental Health Day is suicide prevention and Kent residents needing help are also urged to contact the Release the Pressure Freephone helpline - 0800 107 0160 - where support is available from trained and experienced staff 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. The campaign website www.releasethepressure.uk also includes case studies from men in Kent who have turned their lives around after attempting suicide.

For young people, there is a new web resource attached to the Kent Resilience Hub available atwww.kentresiliencehub.org.uk offering information on promoting and protecting good emotional health. The activities and site is called Moodspark www.moodspark.org.uk and has been developed with young people in Kent. including a young people's editorial board. There is also a resilience toolkit to help schools and organisations consider how they can promote emotional wellbeing within everything they do. These resources have been developed by HeadStart Kent, part of Children, Young People and Education Services. HeadStart aims to help young people cope better when faced with difficult circumstances in their lives, preventing them from experiencing common mental health problems
