I still have to report this month that Coronavirus is still dominating all of our lives, although there has been some easing up of restrictions and hopefully more parishoners feel they no-longer need to self isolate. For all the latest

information please follow government guidelines where new instructions are being given on a daily basis.

Although we still need to socially distance I think a lot of people are feeling more comfortable in going out and last weekend it was interesting to see how many people were on local beaches, plus in Kearsney Abbey. We look forward to when pubs and restaurants re-open and greater normality can return. The village school has successfully re-opened albeit it is not full time yet or for all pupils. It does however seem increasingly likely that the school will be fully open for all in September.

Due to the restrictions there has been little to report on Parish Council although we would like to thank our network of volunteers who carried out a number of tasks to help the vulnerable in the village. They are still available if you require any help and can be contacted through the Parish Clerk, Andy Howard-Grigg (contact details below) who will arrange for someone to carry out the required task.

For the foreseeable future our Parish Council meetings will be conducted online using a video conferencing tool called Zoom, which has so far proved to be a useful alternative to face to face meetings. Last month we held the Annual Parish Council Meeting using this medium and were able to complete the large amount of procedural documentation that as a parish we need to complete on an annual basis. As things are quieter at the moment, the Parish Council have decided to update and renew our Website. The previous one was OK but wasn't compliant with the new "Accessibility Rules" that apply from September, and it was also felt that going forward we need a more professional presentation and our clerk has undertaken this task. We look forward to sharing the results with parishoners very shortly and continuing our goal to have closer links with all village organisations.

We are still waiting for a decision to be made regarding the proposed development of the Railway Bell site before the end of the month and hope the planners share our concerns regarding this site.

We can report however that the development of Manor View nurseries continues. We have tried to minimise (not always successfully) any disruption to villager's lives and we are sure these new houses will be available for sale before too long. We await to see the finished article!

Another issue we have been trying to get solved is the noise, damage and danger caused by illegal motorbikes and quadbikes up on the Minnis. We have reported this to the police and have been assured they are taking action to control this. Please report to the police any nuisance that this causes to you.

I hope you enjoy the current good weather and the chance to get outside in our beautiful village and will update you again next month.



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A tribute to Dame Vera Lynn



Like so many if not all of us, I was deeply saddened at the passing of our national treasure and forces sweetheart, Dame Vera Lynn. At 103 years old, she had lived the most incredible life and one that so many are familiar with. I was blessed to have met her many times through my singing with Annie. The first time we met, we were singing at Goodwood Aeroclub in around 2008 and she came and sat at a table along from us on the veranda. Her companion that day, was a gentleman who we've come to know well and he invited us over to meet Dame Vera.

We were thrilled beyond words and sat for a while with her. She was interested to learn that I was from Dover and recalled her famous song. I've never forgotten one piece of advice she gave to us that first meeting, as she talked about her career and experiences relating to her time entertaining troops in Burma. She said she NEVER leaves a tap running EVER because she has been with soldiers who had no water and would've given ANYTHING just to have some to drink. When she asked for a glass of water whilst there, they told her, they hadn't any. When she was leaving and we returned to our singing, she stood with her friend and watched us for a little while and what a sight that was.. Seeing Dame Vera Lynn standing watching us. Dom was there that day too and took some lovely photos.

We met again at several public occasions including the War and Peace Show and a Land Army Girls Reunion in Brighton, where she sat directly in front of us while we sang. The nerves in that moment were incredible but she said she'd enjoyed the songs and sang along to some of them.

We were invited by her family to become ambassadors for her Childrens Charity in 2009 and we also recorded our song with her, on which she says the most wonderful speech about remembering the sacrifices of our brave veterans and armed forces. She has also been very well connected to another charity of ours The Not Forgotten.

The song raised funds for both charities and was included on her album "Unforgettable".



We were lucky enough to visit her at home many times and the first time, she made us tea. I helped her in the kitchen by carrying in the tray and was thinking "Vera Lynn has just made us tea!!!!" We are both so blessed to have many more memories to remember and treasure, both public and private moments. She was the loveliest lady, so warm and friendly and would light up when speaking about her career. She has shared her personal photo album, which was full of photos sent to her over the years by veterans who she met while in Burma.

She advised us on her favourite songs that we might like to learn, and she chatted about ordinary things, just as if we were chatting to our late nan or grannie. Annie spent extra time with her while organising and producing her 100th birthday show at the Palladium, which will forever be her proudest moment to have given Dame Vera a wonderful celebration. Our last visit with her at her home ended with her advice to "Keep On Smiling and Keep On Singing". She then broke into a chorus of "When You're Smiling." We kissed her goodbye and she always held our hands tightly. At the marvellous age she was, we had prepared for every visit to potentially be our last. We'd dreaded the news for a while but when Annie rang me last Thursday to tell me, it was more overwhelmingly sad than we ever imagined. We were incredibly fond of her and so proud to sing her beautiful songs.

We can only pray that we'll be able to continue to do that in her memory. She has left a big hole in the world but an ever bigger legacy. Sleep peacefully, dearest Dame Vera.. You've earned your rest x x



My hints to get your dahlias growing well — plenty of manure for water retention, a top dressing of Growmore and then 14 days later start to plant out. It is a good idea to plant out in bloom size so it makes it easier as you have to do stopping, which means pinching out the top growth so each dahlia has a set number of flower stems. Keep feeding weekly.

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County Councillor

A proposal has been submitted to Kent County Council's Cabinet Member for Education and Skills to delay this year's Kent Test by approximately a month.

We appreciate that the closure of schools to the majority of pupils during the Covid-19 pandemic has caused a great

deal of uncertainty and anxiety for families about their children's education and for those whose children will participate in the Kent Test, the current uncertainties about a return to school in September are adding to the pressures. We were keen therefore to provide clarity and information to schools, parents/carers and pupils as soon as we could.

We recognise also that being away from school for an extended period will have had an impact on all children's learning, some more than others. The proposal, submitted to Richard Long by the Children, Young People and Education directorate, would allow pupils longer to settle back into the classroom. The proposal also seeks to increase the number of schools parents/carers can name on the Secondary Common Application Form (SCAF) from four to six for one year only.

As soon as it was announced that schools would close to most pupils from Friday, March 20, contingency planning began, looking at what adjustments might be needed to the Kent Test process in different situations as the pandemic unfolded. KCC staff have been engaging with schools, central government and other selective Local Authorities to explore ways of delivering an 11+ assessment process for the pupils due to start secondary school in 2021. We contacted all 431 primary and junior schools in Kent and of the 325 which responded, 91% supported the proposal to delay the Kent Test.

Matt Dunkley, KCC's Corporate Director for Children, Young People and Education, said: "While the pathway to a return to normal school life is still not fully understood, we know it is important that schools, parents/carers and children have adequate notice of any adjustments to the Kent Test process. It has recently become clear that Year 5 pupils are no longer expected to return to school before the start of the new academic year. We are mindful of how much classroom time students have missed and want to give all those taking part the opportunity to settle back into school life before the Kent Test.

Proposals are therefore being made to delay the Kent Test by around one month, with testing for children in Kent schools to potentially take place on Thursday, October 15 and children from outside Kent to be tested from Saturday, October 17. It is important to point out, however, that while these

are our current preferred plans, no one knows what will happen over the coming months with regards to Covid-19 and if Government guidance changes and it is no longer thought safe to accommodate children in school for the testing then our proposal will need to be revised; the safety and well-being of all the pupils and staff involved has to be our overriding priority."

"Assessment through testing has the benefit of being available to students regardless of their current education setting, so it remains our current preference for a selection method. Our process also contains the head teacher appeal stage, which enables further consideration to be given to pupils where it is felt their test scores did not reflect their true ability. KCC will continue to work with schools to help them prepare to apply any social distancing requirements in the new school year. All selective authorities are awaiting advice from the Department for Education about their preferred approach, but in the meantime we want to have discussions with schools so that we can be confident of delivering testing in a fair and safe way for all pupils taking part."

The Kent Test is usually held in early September, allowing parents to know their child's results before they apply for secondary schools at the end of October, a date fixed in national legislation. As a delayed process will mean that results are unlikely to be available until late November, it is proposed that the number of schools that can be named on the Secondary Common Application Form (SCAF) be increased from four to six for one year only, enabling parents to name up to two grammar schools without reducing the number of non-selective schools on their application.

Families considering a grammar school for their child should ensure that they register them to take part in the process by the deadline of Wednesday, July 1. Familiarisation material, which can be used at home, is available via the Kent Test pages on <u>www.kent.gov.uk</u>

A Forthcoming Executive Decision (FED) notice has been published on KCC's website (<u>https://democracy.kent.gov.uk/mgListPlans.aspx?</u> <u>RPId=115&RD=0&bcr=1</u>) providing formal notification of the proposals. The decision will be considered in mid-July and should be finalised before the end of the current school year, barring any extensions to the democratic process. Between now and when the decision will be made, we will continue to work with the Department for Education and schools to ensure all necessary measures are in place by the Test date. These plans are based on central government's current advice in relation to the wider reopening of schools and are subject to change where Covid-19 guidance is updated.
