Works update

The landscapers have now finished the work in Kearsney Parks with just a few smaller jobs to be finished off. The work in Russell Gardens is finished and will be open in the new year.

A new bridge has restored the historic lakeside circular walk in Kearsney Abbey thanks to funding from the National Lottery Heritage Fund and the National Lottery Community Fund. The new pedestrian bridge across the weir at the eastern end of the lake is the latest phase of the £3.1m Parks for People project.

Originally, the estate's boundary walls extended across this part of the lake and featured a castellated 'eye-catcher' with three arches spanning the weir. The masonry remains still form popular "stepping-stones" for those who don't mind getting their feet wet!

The new 14m bridge has a steel superstructure and a timber non-slip deck surface. It is designed for pedestrian use only whilst also providing improved access for wheelchair and mobility scooter users. A new boardwalk connects the bridge with the existing network of paths around the lake, which have also been resurfaced. The plans for the bridge were developed in consultation with the Environment Agency.



Wildlife

The park continues to be a haven for wildlife so during your visit keep an eye out for the egret, heron, kingfisher and cormorant, as well as the easier to spot blackbirds, coots and moorhens.

Volunteering

Looking forward to 2021, there will be a variety of gardening tasks in Kearsney Park and Russell Gardens to undertake,



including the grand border and orchard. If you are interested in volunteering and would like to be put on our database, please get in touch at <u>kearsney.parks@dover.gov.uk</u>.

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
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SCIENCE OR FAITH?

"Happy New Year" to all Temple Ewell residents. We hope that you had as good a Christmas as possible with the various restrictions on meeting with other family members and friends. Our thoughts go out to those that may have found themselves on their own and also to the various keyworkers who had to still work over the Christmas period.

At last we have reason to be optimistic as we move into 2021. Although infection rates remain frustratingly high in East Kent, the vaccination of all has begun. As you are probably aware, this will be rolled out according to age and risk. While we wait, we encourage all to obey the rules by staying at home as much as possible, socially distancing, wearing face coverings and frequently washing our hands. If we are all diligent, the infection rates and resulting hospitalisation and deaths will reduce. It is difficult to tell when we will be back to normal (or what the new normal will be), but in the meantime we must be patient.

Due to the current restrictions, the school has had to close for most children, but the staff have rolled out extensive online learning to help most children learn at home. It is hoped the school can fully re-open before too long.

The village shop has become the main focal point for the village and as more is bought and sold online, the post office side of the business has been increasingly busy. River Post Office has ceased to take any parcels, further increasing custom for the village shop. I think it is now commonplace to see queues of facemask wearing villagers waiting patiently outside. For those wary of venturing out to the supermarkets, their range of provisions has provided a much needed service to local residents. The valuable role played by Robert and Donna has recently been recognised as they were nominated for and then won a local community award along with a cheque for \pounds 500.00.

We do not have a Parish Council meeting in December so there has not been too much to report on since my last article. Also, there has been less activity due to being in Tier 4/5 level of lockdown and most people being at home for more time than usual.

We had a virtual Christmas lights turn on event at the start of December

which was streamed live on Facebook and featured myself and Santa Claus by the Christmas Tree. Santa spoke and when he magically uttered the word "sparkle" the lights suddenly came on. Players Corner and the tree were lit at night for the whole of the festive period. However, we did have a few high winds which caused the tree to stand at a precarious angle on occasions and the decorations were scattered down London Road. Thanks are due to anyone who contributed in straightening the tree or re-affixing the baubles etc !!

Our work on the Highways Improvement Plan (HIP) has continued and at the next Parish Council meeting we will hopefully make some decisions that will lead to safety improvements around the village. These include a proposed zebra crossing in London Road by the junction of Templeside and High Street plus a 20mph speed limit in Lower Road. It is also likely that Kent Highways in conjunction with River Parish Council will place an additional zebra crossing on London Road near the Railway Bell.

The Manor View development is nearing completion and the first families moved in just before Christmas. We welcome these new residents to the village and expect the rest of the properties to be finished in the next few weeks. We would however ask that their privacy be respected and that while building work is taking place, that people do not enter this part of the site.

We have a number of plans for 2021 and hope to continue to tackle various projects around the village. The pace at which this happens will be dictated by the levels of lockdown but rest assured we will keep the community informed. It is always worth a look at the Parish Council website which has now overcome a few initial glitches and is on <u>www.templeewellpc.world</u>. Please also look out for our facebook and twitter posts.

I have continued with my frequent walks around the village and have also more recently gone further afield to Alkham, Coldred and Waldershare Park. It is interesting that many of the small tracks that I now walk on were much more widely used, back in Victorian times, before the current road network was established. Many of these would have been used by horses and carts and carriages but are now barely wide enough for pedestrians. I look forward to catching up with you again next month.

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




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

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Do not book a test if you are <u>self-isolating</u> or have any COVID symptoms:


The test involves taking a swab of the inside of your nose and the back of your throat (tonsils), using a long cotton bud. You will do the swab yourself in a booth. The booths will be cleaned after each use.

You should get your result within 2 hours of completing the test, through the contact details you supply. You should not stay at the testing centre.

If you test positive, you will need to self-isolate for 10 days. You must <u>take a</u> <u>home test</u> to confirm the result. Other people in your household should isolate for 14 days.

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

Dear Resident, Owner, or Occupier,

Government preparations for the end of the transition period with the EU

I am writing to you regarding development of land at White Cliffs, Dover as an inland border facility as part of the Government's preparations for the end of the EU transition period. I want to explain the latest plans for the site, and to invite you to comment on the proposals during a period of local engagement which will run from 13^{th} January $2021 - 2^{nd}$ February 2021.

The White Cliffs site will be a temporary facility used by Her Majesty's Revenue & Customs (HMRC) and the Department for Environment Food & Rural Affairs (Defra) for up to five years, as an additional 'Office of Departure/Arrival' for goods moved under 'transit' customs arrangements and as a Border Control Post (BCP) for goods needing sanitary and phytosanitary checks (SPS) from 1 July 2021. The White Cliffs site would not be used as a lorry park.

This site was identified through a cross-government assessment of services we would need to provide for exports and imports after exiting the European Union. The government committed to build inland facilities where there was no space for ports to expand. The Port of Dover does not have sufficient land to build the infrastructure required for the new checks on EU imports including animals, plants and animal/plant

products such as food, to continue to maintain UK biosecurity, which is a legal requirement.

A Border Control Post (BCP) will carry out these essential biosecurity checks and must be located as close to the point of entry as possible with access to the strategic road network. White Cliffs was identified as the most suitable location to support the Port of Dover due to its strategic location - it is just four miles away and is close to the A2.

The site will not be used as a lorry park. However, it will include areas for HGVs and other vehicles as well as security measures and facilities to enable the checking of vehicles and goods entering and exiting the site. The number of HGVs that can be stationed at White Cliffs at any one time will be limited.

After entering the site, HGVs will visit a check point before being directed to a vacant space where they will undertake the appropriate checks as required. Checks will include paperwork inspection, as well as inspection of goods and consignments. Once the checks are complete, they will continue their journey.

These proposals are temporary and are designed to ensure no significant or long-term environmental effects. The Department of Transport (DfT), alongside other Government departments, has reviewed the options for use of the site and, based on current planning, expect the site to be needed for up to five years.

Approval for the site will be sought under the requirements of a Special Development Order (SDO). As part of the SDO, DfT is preparing a stakeholder engagement report that will record the views of individuals and organisations that provide feedback.

DfT is conducting local engagement about the proposed use of the White Cliffs inland border facility which will run from Wednesday 13th January 2021 – Tuesday 2nd February 2021. Feedback received during the community engagement period will help shape details of the

planning submission, and I would therefore welcome your views on the proposals.

Further details of the proposals, including an information booklet for the White Cliffs site, can be viewed on our website at <u>www.inlandborderfacilities.uk</u>, where feedback can be provided from Wednesday 13th January until Tuesday 2nd February 2021.

I would encourage you to use the feedback form on the website but hard copies of the information booklet and feedback form are also enclosed to this letter should you prefer using the paper form.

Updates regarding the progress of the White Cliffs scheme will be posted on the website.
